FRESNO--That Ku Klux Klan and other groups fostering racial and religious intolerance are reviving in California and particu larly in the Los Angele. area was charged here last week by the joint legislative interim committee on un-American activities and investigation to expose them was authorized.

Such old acquaintances as the Communists, the German-American Bund and more than two score other groups under scrutiny by the committee for the last several years also were included in the scope of the investigation.

The Klan was named during executive sessions which resulted in formal resolutions to authorize investigations, conduct hearings and report findings to the legislature so that "remedial legislation" may be considered. No details of Klan organization were -continued on page 3----

TODAY, ON AMERICAN SOIL, thousands of miles from Pisa, I have been wounded again by another weapon -hypocrisy or prejudice, call it what you will. Little did I expect that upon my return home to the people for whom I fought and suffered I would be repudiated."

So wrote Pfc.Richard H. Naito from a hospital in Spokane, Wash., to the Spokane Post No. 51, Veterans of Foreign Wars, which had turned "thumbs down" on his application for membership in that organization. He was wounded while fighting with the Fifth Army (442nd Infantry) in Italy.

This is another proof that nisei servicemen are still looked upon with disfavor along the Pacific coast, despite their fine battle records.

The post's action was sharply censured in Rome by Col. V. R. Miller, commander of the nisei regiment, and John J. McCloy, Assistant Secretary of War. Colonel Miller wrote the post to "correct this grave injustice."

But out in Spokane Dean Helbig, post commander, wasn't much impressed and remained adamant, stating that the rejection was "final." He asserted Naito's application, as well as that of Pvt. Thomas M. Imai, another applicant, were rejected for "the good of the post." However, he said their rejection was not based on discrimination.

"The boys (Caucasian) returning from the South Pacific will have no use for Japanese of any kind," Helbig explained. "If they meet Japanese members in the clubrooms, anything might happen and we don't want trouble."

very few South Pacific veterans will come home with "no-wse-for-Japanese" thoughts in mind. In fact, a vast majority of them look upon Nisei GI's as comrades in arms. On that took drastic means to corscore Helbig is "talking rect such an attitude.

ARRANGE PROPERTY TRANSFER

Aug. 15, 1945

To Center Residents:

NOW is the time for us to help you in getting quick and efficien service on the handling of your express and freight. We have the lumber, trucks and sufficient manpower to help you in getting your household goods handled properly and carefully. Don't delay and be caught in the RUSH of closing the conter.

If you need lumber for crating, just make application for it at the evacuee property office and it will be delivered. We will pick up crated articles for freight and express, if you will let us know 48 hours in advance. Requests for shipping are made out on form WRA-156. Then we mail each person, shipping freight or express, a government Bill of Lading which he must keep and present to the transportation company in order to get delivery on his shipped goods. An unavoidable delay will be caused if this Bill of Lading is misplaced or lost--so keep it in a safe place.

Each full railroad ticket allows 150 pounds of personal baggage. Beyond that, the government will pay expressage up to 500 pounds on cooking utensils, bedding, and clothing. More than that amount can be shipped by freight, which takes three or four weeks to reach the West Coast.

The property office has also made arrangements to store goods temporarily in the center WRA warehouse if necessary. A request for such storage can be made by filling out form WRA-223.

EVACUEES TO GET UNUSED ARMY HOUSING FACILITIES

SAN FRANCISCO -- An agreement has been effected recently in Washington whereby unused Army housing facilicies will be made available to evacueus of Japanese ancestry returning from relocation centers, according to the San Francisco CHRON-ICLE. The Army units will be of dormitory nature.

The CHRONICLE reported that efforts are being made to get WRA officials in Washing on to accept "a more realistic attitude" toward the lansing situation in the San Francisco area. It was also noted that local officials were doubtful that su ficient facilities would be found to meet the needs of returning evacuees.

An effort is being made to interest the local Chamber of Commerce in the problem. There was no opposition to the return of schedule Monday. evacuees, but fear was felt that many or them will be unable to obtain housing and will suffer new hardships if the camps closed on specified dates before other arrangements can be made.

Sugar stamp No. 36 is good for five pounds through Aug. 31.

When ovacuees on short term passes return to the center without converting to terminal leave, the ration books must be returned and tailored in accordance with the length of time
