Activities of the night school and general adult education program at the Amache Center open Monday. Headquarters for all activities will be at the night school office in 8H laundry building.

Night classes will be opened from 7 to 9 o'clock each evening, Monday through Friday. Additional classes can be started if more than 10 persons are interested, Mulford declared.

## BRIDGE, DENTURE SERVICE POSSIBLE

Twenty-five qualified specialists staff the Granada dental clinic which has established temporary quarters in the fourth ward of the Project hospital.

The personnel is headed by Dr. George Nagamoto, nine years a faculty member of the USC College of Dentistry.

The seven-chair clinic, operated by 16 qualified dentists, is well-equipped to handle surgical, operative, and pathological cases.

Within a month a laboratory is to be finished, and the making and repairing of dentures, and crown and bridgework will be possible.

Evacuation cut short one of Tom Okamoto's important contributions to the war effort. Tom, who is now an art instructor at the Project high school, was working on Walt Disney's educational cartoon movies for the United States Navy, and the Canadian Army and a South American good will picture, commissioned by the United States government when Gen. DeWitt's order came through.

Okamoto came to the Disney studio in January, 1941, after a year at United Artists. He specialized in background work and helped make "Dumbo" and "Bambi," the latest Walt Disney feature-length productions, and shorter pix.

After graduating from Sacramento high school and junior college, Okamoto studied for four years at the famed Chouinard Art Institute in Los Angeles and became interested in motion picture animation when he saw "Snow White" in 1937.
