SCHOOL SUPPLIES OFFERED TO STUDENTS AT LOW COST

The first Amache Senior High School students' enterprise began this morning with the opening of the Co-op store on the campus in 6A.

The store's Board of Directors and Policy Committee will operate the business for the first week so it will be able to decide on definite policies and become acquainted with the problems.

The hours for the first week are 8:30 to 9:15 in the morning, and 12:45 to 1:45 in the afternoon.

The merchandise now on sale includes pencils, pens, notebooks and fillers, rulers, erasers, drawing paper, ink, and other school supplies. These goods were bought through the Consumer's Enterprises at cost plus 15 percent for freight. Requests for any other item to be sold should be taken to the Vice-President of the corporation.

This store is run on a share-profit basis.

There are approximately 320 Co-op members, making a capital of \$80. Membership may still be bought for 25 cents at the store.

The Board of Directors consisting of Joe Kamiya, president; Misako Kawaguchi, vice-president; Mariano Konishi, secretary; George Okabe, treasurer; and Joe Sugawara, personnel director; and four members of the Policy Committee; Joy Takeyama, Kenneth Amamoto, Alice Yamasaki, and Dorothy Sato, met Saturday to get the stock in shape and the store under way.
