SATOW GUEST SPEAKER AT SCHOOL ASSEMBLY

Mr. Masao Satow, representative of the National Y.M.C.A., was featured at an assembly held on Friday, March 3. The inspiring talk concerned his various experiences on the "outside."

The two major points emphasized by Mr. Satow were (1) that we continue writing to our friends on the West Coast and (2) that we do everything we can to strengthen the hands of our friends who are trying to help us.

He also made some constructive suggestions as to our attitude upon relocation, among which were (1) don't assume an apologetic manner, (2) go out on a positive basis, and (3) know what America is.

Mr. Satow referred to his analogy of the burning log, radiating its experiences, several times during the course of his speech.

The assembly was sponsored by the Amache Senior High School Hi-Y with Min Takata, president of the organization, acting as chairman for the assembly. The platform guest was Mr. Melvin P. McGovern, sponsor of the Amache Hi-Y.

EDITORIAL

Nominations for student body officers had to be reopened twice, because there was no one willing to run for president. The second-semester election for senior class officers had to be run off without candidates for the office of president.

The usual excuse was "Oh, but I don't think I'm capable enough for that office." Modesty is a nice thing to have, but only to a certain extent. Is this genuine modesty? Or is it just a convenient excuse to get out of assuming some responsibility? If this keeps up, the answers to these questions will become yes and no, respectively. Perhaps this is already true.

"Aw heck, but I want to mess around and have my share of fun!" is a declaration we hear quite often. It's a ten-to-one bet that the person who assumes responsibility and helps others is a much happier person, in the end, than the person who greedily grabs fun just for himself.

So many of us Nisei are caught crabbing that we are discriminated against. No wonder! No one wants cringing violets in his society. The Nisei students are known for their neatness, politeness, and "straight" A's. These are fine things to have, but they are worthless without the leadership to emphasize them.

GIRLS' ALL STAR IN SWING INDIANS END SEASON

12 WINS - 1 LOSS 3-5 TIED!!!

The Amache Indians, under the guidance of Coach John C. Hoke, ended their 1943-1944 basketball season with a record of 12 wins and one loss.

Amache opened the season in grand style by defeating the Wiley Panthers in a one way game, 60 to 20. Inspired by this win, Amache hit the war path for eight more victorious games but were stopped cold by Adam City. The Indians' defeated rivals are Wiley (2), Granada, McClave, Lincoln Park, Bulldogs, Fort Lupton (2), and Adams City B.

The only game that stopped Amache from a perfectly successful season was from Adams City. Coming in on the home stretch, the Indians won the remaining three games from Granada, McClave, and last years' Alumni.

There were many high-lights during the season, among which was the outstanding Granada game which really raised the roof in a thriller, 27 to 26. In the games at Denver, which our boys will remember for days to come, the Indians totalled 314 points while holding down the opponents to only 159 points.

Fourteen players performed for the Amache Indians with only four players returning next season.

The Girls' All-Star tournament got underway March 6th when the fifth period Freshmen-Sophomore "Drips", lead by all-star Amiye Kinoshita, defeated the first period Freshmen-Sophomore, "Bucket-Swishers", 18 to 6.

Three days later the sixth period Junior-Seniors tied for first place by winning a lopsided game from the second period Juniors-Seniors 23 to 6.

Due to the assembly held last Friday afternoon, the game between the Freshmen-Sophomore 1 and 2 classes was postponed. "This game will probably take place this afternoon," stated Miss Korsoski, Girls' P.E. instructor.
