Originally intended as plans for an army cantonment, they had been laid aside when Urawas dismissed from gami his job.

But when blueprints for the construction of Manzanar had to be drawn up, the war department recovered Uragami's plans. Altering his designs slightly, but retaining the basic plans, they began work on the

buildings.
Uragami studied architecture at the University of Southern California for four years, but did not complete the five-year course. Instead, he accepted an offer from the War department to draft plans for military airports and cantonments on the West coast.
