LATE FLASHES

7,425 HAWAII NISEI VOLUNTEER

A total of 7,425 Japanese-American men from Hawaii have volunteered to serve in the Army's special combat unit for nisei, an Associated Press dispatch stated today.

The figure represents 30 per cent of the 25,000 eligible men between the ages of 18 and 35, the AP release said.

POULTRY PROJECT TO BE STARTED ON KOEN RANCH

A poultry project to supply eggs and fowl for the center mess tables is now being started, Henry W. Schmits, farm superintendent, revealed today.

He said that six oil brooders, a part of the poultry equipment, was received at the center last week, and orders have been placed for 5000 baby chicks.

The poultry, which will be quartered on the Koen ranch, is under the supervision of Henry Shimizu. The first phase of the project will be the raising of laying hens, then all efforts will be directed toward the breeding of meat

chickens for the consumption of the residents, Schmits said.

He stressed the immediate need for experienced poultrymen.

Meanwhile the hog project is in full progress. Some 450 hogs are being raised on the Koen ranch.

Plans are now underway to split the farm into operational units, each to be in charge of a unit supervisor, who will be in complete charge of crop production in his own unit. Persons wishing to apply for jobs as unit supervisors may apply at the farm in the engineer's building.

FOUR SONS IN ARMED FORCES

ALIEN LAND BILL KILLED

Rather than give Chinese and Filipinos—American war allies—a direct affront, the House judiciary committee of the Colorado state legislature recently killed a bill to bar aliens of Asiatic races from owning land in Colorado.

The bill, introduced by Representative Charles C. Townsend of Greeley, was similar to the California alien land law. Its intent was to bar Japanese from owning land in Colorado, but other Asiatic races had to be included to make the bill constitutional.

A similar bill, with different provisions, has been introduced in the Senate.

Thumbnail SKETCHES

Ironically, the building plans chosen for the construction of the first WRA center, Manzanar, were those drafted by Thomas T. Uragami before evacuation, while he was in the employ of the war department in Los Angeles. Originally intended as plans for an army cantonment, they had been laid aside when Uragami was dismissed from his job.

But when blueprints for the construction of Manzanar had to be drawn up, the war department recovered Uragami's plans. Altering his designs slightly, but retaining the basic plans, they began work on the buildings.

Uragami studied architecture at the University of Southern California for four years, but did not complete the five-year course. Instead, he accepted an offer from the War department to draft plans for military airports and cantonments on the West coast.

Aeronautically-minded since early boyhood, he finally realized one of his dreams when he received his civilian pilot's license after completing a course at college. He has spent many Sundays piloting a rented plane.

During leisure hours at home and in this center, Uragami has designed and constructed hundreds of flying airplane models. His apartment is cluttered with them, and one corner of the room has been converted into a regular workshop.

A brilliant student, he has been awarded memberships in two honored art fraternities.

One of Uragami's big desires is to complete his education and earn his degree at an eastern university.

Another ambition is to join the Army air corps.

He rather hesitantly admits that he has a girl friend who is an instructor at the Naval Language school at Boulder. But he doesn't disclose her name.

The preliminary game will be played between the Sepol girls and the undefeated 7K Starlettes at 7 p.m.

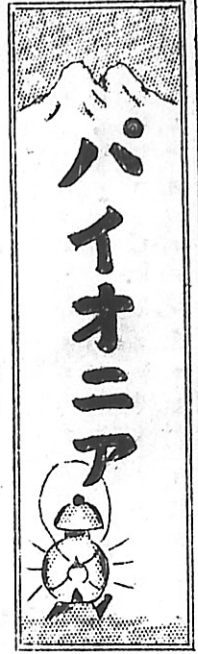
