## RED CROSS QUOTA SET

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## TOWN HALL TALK

Louis G. Temple, who is in charge of the landscaping, has some bad news for center residents--in all likelihood, no trees, no shrubs, no grass this year.

Director Lindley had given his approval for the purchase of trees and shrubs amounting to \$3375. Word, however, came from Washington that all expenditures for plants to beautify the center will need their approval.

The purchase of the plants can be justified by soil condition here and the need of plants to keep down the sand. Approval in all probability will be forthcoming, but it may not be in time for the planting season. The plants must be put in now while they are dormant for it will be too late after growth has started.

Since all WRA purchases over \$500 must be submitted for bids, delay will be inevitable even if the purchase is approved immediately.

Irrigational facilities must be provided because rainfall cannot be depended upon for a source of water.

For irrigational purposes a pipeline and pump are needed, but to date purchase has not been possible because of priorities. Unless these materials are obtained immediately, they cannot be installed in time for use even if the plants are obtained. And under the circumstances it will be foolish to put in the plants and let them die.

Because the present facilities for domestic water is not adequate to supply additional water for irrigational purposes, planting by the block is being discouraged. For what may be a little extra water to a block when multiplied by all the blocks will put a severe crimp on the domestic water supply.

Although the blocks are advised against it, there is nothing to prevent any block from planting if they wish to gamble on the rainfall. However, they must not tap the domestic water supply.

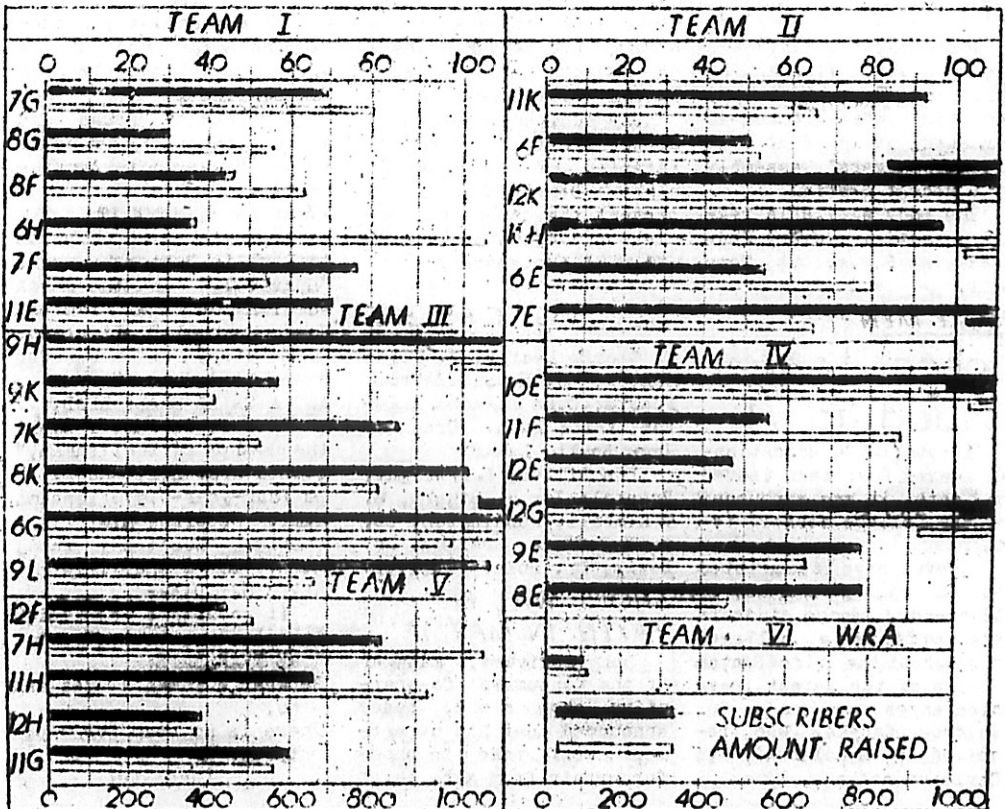
