ENLISTMENT ENDS TODAY; MINIDOKA HEADS LIST

RED CROSS NETS \$1795

A special appeal is being directed towards single and unattached men who answered "Yes, if drafted" to number 27 of the questionnaire to come in for Army enlistment before it closes at 4:30 p.m. today, said Walter J. Knodel, administrative member of the military team.

Quite a number of last-minute volunteers have been

reporting to the employment office. According to statistics, men with a greater amount of responsibilities have come in, he added.

In a wire received yesterday, WRA Director Dillon S. Myer announced that 300 Minidoka residents volunteered for the Army.

The 300 volunteers include 41 who are married and 24 with children, and 11 Japanese-born men who are not eligible for service at the present time.

Project Director James G. Lindloy reminded residents that enlistments will be taken until 4:30 p.m. today at the office of Walter J. Knodel.

The Granada relocation center raised \$1794.93 as its contribution to the Red Cross War fund, announced John O. Moore, head of the drive. Of this amount, \$640.17 came from the administrative personnel and \$1254.76 from the evacuees.

The education department led all the administrative divisions with a contribution of \$146, while 8K turned in the largest sum among the center blocks, with \$60.35.

No active soliciting was carried on among the evacuees, nor was there a quota set. All contributions by the center residents were voluntary, Moore reminded. The \$500 goal set for this project applied to the administrative personnel only.

Moore expressed his appreciation for the co-operation he received from both the administrative staff and the evacuees. The result, he thought, was quite remarkable.

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TOWN HALL TALK

The question of compensation for the executive committee of the council has come up. It is a full time job with a great deal of responsibility.

The WRA, however, cannot pay their salaries because it is an elective office.

By the charter the income from license fees from all sources is limited to \$1,000 for a calendar year. And as there is no other source of income, it is impossible to pay the five executive committeemen \$19 a month.

At the present time the problem is not acute as three of the five men are retaining their positions in other departments, and are being paid by the departments.

If both the department heads and the residents are satisfied, there would seem to be no problem. But this is not a healthy condition. The Amache community government is using five workers whom they cannot pay because of a restriction in the charter.

To consider amending the charter accepted by the people, just six weeks ago may seem previous, but unless the council is presented with other sources of income besides the license fees, the \$1,000 limit will have to be removed.

Police Chief Harlow Tomlinson is of the opinion that an erection of a jail is not necessary, and many of the councilmen are of the same opinion.

In other centers disturbances which otherwise might not have existed have centered around the jails. If jailing is necessary, the chief favors taking the offenders to Lamar.

Labor on some special project has been suggested as a method of punishment for lawbreakers rather than a fine or confinement, but nothing definite has been worked out as yet.

Another Step

When the exclusion line in Arizona was moved to the south, putting Poston and Gila in an unrestricted zone and giving 215 persons evacuated from this area a right to return home immediately, Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, said, "It is still another step toward re-establishing normal life to persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the West coast."

It may be still another step, but it is an important step. With race-baiting groups advocating legislations to prevent the return of the people of Japanese blood to the evacuated areas, the order by the War department opening the once evacuated area, however slight, to these people again, puts hope in the hearts of many that normal life may be re-established soon. The realization of sincerity of the War department's efforts to hurry the return to normalcy becomes more acute with this tangible evidence of their effort.

Ruth Hudson, the center's public health nurse, released the following suggestions for the prevention of such contagious diseases as measles, chicken pox, mumps, and whooping cough:

Check the appearance of rash on children every morning.

Keep children away from others who have colds, as all the above mentioned diseases begin with a common cold.

Report to the public health nurse or clinic doctor any member of the family who shows any of the suggested symptoms.

Children under 5 years of age should be watched especially, Miss Hudson cautioned.

YONEMURA FAMILY AIDS RED CROSS

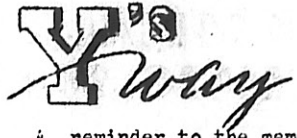

HOSPITAL CLARIFIES VOLUNTEERS TO CLINIC SCHEDULE TO BE PAID

Clarification of the clinic schedule was announced by Dr. W. T. Carstarphen, chief medical officer, Monday.

General clinic hours are from 2 to 4 p.m., Mondays through Fridays, and from 1:30 to 11:30 p.m., Saturdays. There is no clinic on Saturday afternoons or Sundays, and only emergency cases are accepted.

Special clinics are held

between 9:30 and 11:30 a.m., Mondays through Fridays, on the following schedule: Monday, venereal; Tuesday, chest; Wednesday, well baby; Thursday, gynecology; and Friday, prenatal.

Those desiring treatment are asked to register with the receptionist. Although doctors examine patients between 2 and 4 p.m., registration is from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Those coming after this time are often turned away because the waiting line usually keeps the doctors busy after hours, Dr. Carstarphen concluded.

Arrangements to pay volunteers their February pay with cash have been completed, and enlistees are asked to call at the office of Herbert T. Weiler, agent cashier, room 10, north administration building, according to Ruby C. Fuller, principal clerk.

Since a few of the regular pay rolls have already been sent to the Denver disbursing office for payment by check, some of the enlistees will receive theirs as soon as the checks arrive. If the checks fail to arrive in time, however, volunteers are asked to leave forwarding addresses so that their pay may be sent to them, Miss Fuller said.

FARM FRONT

The project farm poultry program is swinging into action with Henry Shimizu at the helm. Some 6,500 chicks have been ordered,* and 1,000 are expected in the next few days. Already seven chicken brooder stoves have arrived and have been installed in the houses located on the Koen Ranch. Each of these shelters has three rooms measuring 11 ft. by 11½ ft., and it's expected that each house will accommodate 500 chicks.

The hog project is under the supervision of Ena Nakamura who has done a splendid job in building up the hog enterprise. Starting with only 25 hogs in September, the project now has over 400 heads and is anticipating an increase to over 1,000 within the next few months. The hogs are sheltered in over twenty pens, constructed from scrap material found on the project, and each pen measures 110 ft. by 15 ft.

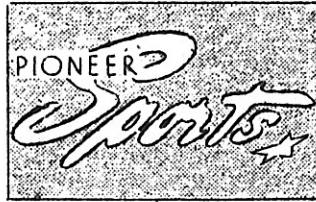

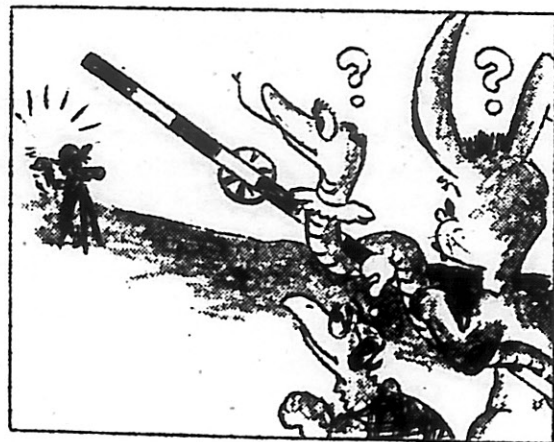

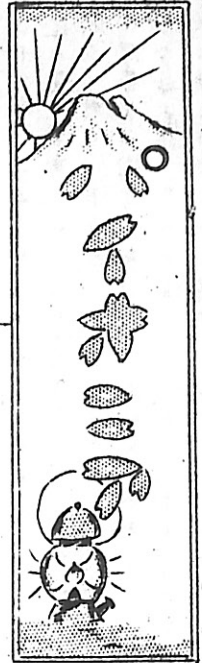
