RECRUITS TO TRAVEL LIGHT

Army enlistees were today reminded by Walter J. Knodel, selective service registrar for the center, that clothing worn by them enroute to reception centers is the maximum amount required by the Army.

All recruits will receive complete clothing, including underwear and socks, together with toilet articles, including towels, razor, shaving brush, tooth brush and comb, almost immediately upon arrival.

Musical instruments, cameras, and other articles of entertainment nature should not be taken to the reception center, but should be forwarded to the recruit after he has been assigned.

Enlistees who arrive at reception centers with excessive amounts of personal effects will be required to ship them home.

"This not only adds an extra load to postal and express services, but also additional time, inconvenience, and expense to the recruit and the government," Knodel said.

NATURALIZATION BILL INTRODUCED IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13--A bill giving all Orientals the right to become naturalized citizens of the United States was introduced in the House of Representatives recently by Congressman Vito Marcantonio of New York.

Marcantonio's bill, which would amend the Nationality act of 1940, was referred to the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization. The text of the bill:

Trustees Bring Farm Reports

G. A. Momberg, Hugh H. Griswold, Dave R. Ritschi, Peter J. McLaughlin, and Harry Lomon acting as managers, trustees, and friends for evacuees from the Livingston and Cortez areas arrived yesterday to make a detailed report on the 1942 farm operations of the 3,700 acres of fruit and vegetable left behind by their former neighbors.

Momberg, formerly manager of the Calif. Lands Inc., is the supervisor of the properties left by the evacuee farm cooperatives.

The group is conferring daily with the evacuees about future plans. They will leave Tuesday.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 303 of the Nationality Act, of 1940, approved October 14, 1940 (54 Stat. 1142, 8 U.S.C. 703), be, and hereby is, amended by striking out the said section and enacting a new section replacing it to read as follows: "THE RIGHT OF A PERSON TO BECOME A NATURALIZED CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES SHALL NOT BE DENIED OR ABRIDGED BECAUSE OF RACE, COLOR, CREED, OR NATIONAL ORIGIN."

Commented the Japanese American Committee for Democracy:

"The passage of this bill will establish the equality of the Asiatic people with all other people, thus providing a fundamental basis for ending discrimination because of race, color, creed, or national origin.

"It will for the first time recognize the Asiatic people in America as part of the whole American people and will lead to their full integration into the national life of our country and its war effort, strengthening national unity and our all-out production program for victory.

"It will strike a tremendous blow at the Axis and against Axis propaganda by discarding a false and arbitrary differentiation between people of different races, and proving that America is engaged in a real people's war for a peace based on true democracy."

CONSUMER ENTERPRISES TO SELL SCRIP BOOKS

So that patronage sales may be computed more easily, scrip books will soon be sold by the Amache Consumer Enterprises, inc., said E. H. Runcorn, associate superintendent.

The scrip book in denominations of \$2.50, \$5, and \$10 will be sold regularly at the Consumer Enterprise office, clothing and variety stores, canteen, shoe shop, and optometry office.

Colorado's 2 per cent sales tax will be paid by the scrip book purchaser at the time of purchase.

The new system will eliminate the use of cash re-

gister slips as a means of recording patronage sales. Patronage will be credited to the purchaser immediately following the sale of the scrip book. Said Runcorn:

"A room full of cash register slips to be counted each quarter is unthinkable; hence scrip books must be used to secure records as a basis for patronage savings.

"Consumers who make cash purchases will not have patronage records; so the 'profit' of cash purchases will be subject to heavy corporation income taxes and cannot be returned to the consumer."

Not A Racial War

A bill giving all persons, regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin a right to become naturalized citizens was introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Vito Marcantonio.

The fact that a congressman of the United States has the courage of his conviction--that this is not a racial war--to introduce such a bill into the House of Representatives is heartening.

At a time when fanatics are busily trying to prove that the Axis is right in saying this is a racial war by making an effort to strip American citizens of their birthright because of race, Marcantonio's action goes far toward proving that this war is being fought so that the American way of life may continue.

The passage of such a bill should erase any lingering belief existing in the minds of our people that the racial barrier confronting the people of Japanese ancestry is insurmountable.

Closer cooperation with the block managers was promised by Paul Freier of the housing department.

From this week, reports of all incoming and outgoing persons, permanent or temporary, will be made to the block managers.

The authority for making any moves, however, rests with the housing department, and although it may consult the managers, it need not seek their consent.

Freier feels that decentralizing responsibilities by letting the block managers have authority to approve moves will make their job more difficult without helping the housing situation.

In the result of contributions to the Red Cross War Fund, 8K was credited with turning in the largest sum of \$60.35, but Fred Morimoto of 6G says the contribution from this block amounted to \$60.40.

Five other blocks, 11E, 11F, 11H, 7H, and 8E, surpassed the \$50 mark in donations.

Lots of credit to them and to all the other blocks for "going over the top" as Tazi Sasaki put it.

Next to Yonemura's contribution of \$14, a \$1 for each member of his family, Seiichihiro Takahashi's \$10 was the largest individual donation among the evacuees.

Revised administrative instructions received from WRA Director Dillon S. Myer state that evacuees who accept private employment outside a WRA project will not be permitted to live in the center.

Residents who accept such employment, including seasonal farm labor, must make arrangements to live outside the center for the duration of the work, Myer concluded.

This council is composed of recently selected representatives of the 13 general education classes of the junior high school.

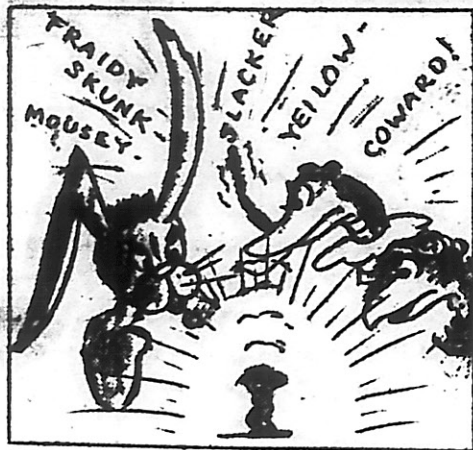
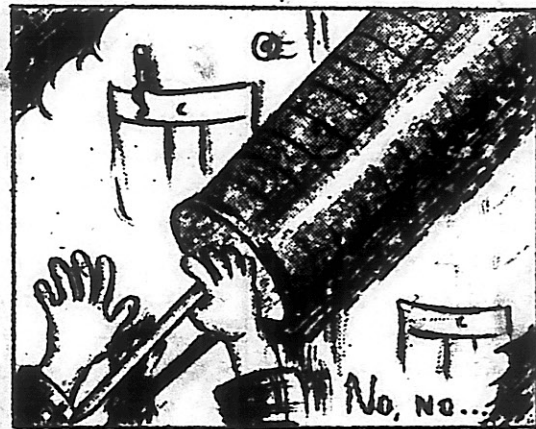
