Said the Tribune:

"Two-thirds of the interned Japanese are American citizens. That, also, is something new under our constitutional system. On that theory can an American citizen be looked up, with or without trial, because of his race? it is a matter of concern to all American citizens if any American citizen can be put in a concentration comp."

Can a newspaper the size of the Chicago Tribune fail to realize that these are not concentration camps-or is the newspaper guilty of trying to discredit the Administration? Surely by now the program of the WRA in aiding evacues to re-establish themselves within the general American public is familiar to everyone, including the big newspapers. The editor could have mentioned the many ways in which the evacuees are gradually being returned to normal society.

Mistakes may have been made during the course of emergency evacuation, but that is a past incident. Only the future is important now-a future fit for the people fighting for it. Above all things we must have cooperation throughout our nation in order to realize the ideals set forth for our people by the present Administration. If those ideals are worth fighting and dying for, then they're worth all the cooperation we can give, and it's through the Government that we give it.

### Nisei Soldiers

Misei is a word which up to now is known to few Americans east of the Pacific West, but which we have a notion will be well and favorably known to all of us before the war is over. A nisei is an American-born citizen whose parents were Japanese.

There are a large number of nisei in the Far West, Most of them are as loyal to the United States as any other group of Americans. Until precently, however, they were not eligible for service in our armed forces

in this war with Japan and its Axis partners.

About a month ago, Secretary of War Stimson announced that nisei from then on would be accepted for training in special units, including infantry, artillery, engineer and medical personnel, and would see actual fighting service in due course. Under present arrangements, nisei can get into these services through draft boards in their communities.

It seems beyond dispute to us that this is the right way to handle the matter. We feel confident, too, that these men will become tough and valiant fighters for the country of their parents' adoption. Judging from our boys' experiences with the Jap soldiers on New Guinea and Guadalcanal, we can well afford to turn some Japanese-descended fighting talent against the

original Japs.

· Our editor, Robert Seiichiro Hirano, better known as Bob, or "Chin," is the fellow who shoulders all responsitifies, receives all the complaints, stands up for his co-workers, and, takes the least credit for something well done.

### DEPARTMENT STAND DEMOTIVATED.

SACRALENTO, March 11. --The State Personnel board, which has acted to remove Japanese-American employes from state service, has been cautioned by the State department to "take no action which would be inconsistent with policy toward loyal American citizens of alien parentage."

The board last year discharged 74 civil service employes of Japanese ancestry and the Board of Equalization fired an . additional 13. About 150 probationary and temporary workers were dismissed. Most of the employes, now in relocation centers, have requested hearings.

OTTAWA, March 16 .-- About 90 per cent of the Japanese fishing fleet, soized by the Canadian government after Pearl Harbor, will be returned to active fishing, the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal committee said this week.

Of the 1,337 vessels taken over by the committee, 950 have been sold, 200 returned to their owners, and 187 transferred to the Alien Property custodian.

## CHICAGO WRA OFFICE IS EXPLAINED

CHICAGO, March 16 .-- The work of the WRA employment office here was explained by Correspondent Dorothea Kahn this week in the Christian Science Monitor.

Head of the office, which serves Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, and Michigan, is Elmer L. Shirrell, former Californian, who served

as a WRA administrator at

Tule Lake.

Shirrell points out that the office does not intend to do any wholesale relocating, but will "keep its ear to the ground to find opportunities, and then bring the prospective employer and employee together, letting them take care of the rest of the negotiations."

"Four field men will work out of this office in co-operation with the United States Employment service. They will visit communities in which are found people willing to employ Japanese labor making certain that it will be reasonably friendly to the new omers, and that the particular jobs offered are at prevailing wages" the Monitor said.

Shirrell explained that great care will be taken that those encouraged to take positions in the interior are people of the best type.


VARSITY CAGERS DRUB B'S;

Starting with a bang, the Granadans, paced by speedy Libby Tymer penetrated the center girls' weak defense to lead at the end of the first half, 19-11.


