NEW SYSTEM OF PASS ISSUANCE ANNOUNCED

A new system for the issuance of gate passes will become effective on April 1, according to Project Director James G. Lindley. This system is to aid in standardizing and clarifying methods of handling gate passes for evacuees and Japanese-American visitors.

Yellow cards will be for short-term absences; green, indefinite leave; blue, Japanese-American visitors; white, WRA workers and authorized visits outside of the center.

The leave officer will issue the yellow and green gate passes at the time of leave. These will be divided in two sections, A to be retained by the guard at the gate, and B for the evacuee.

Visitors to the center must register with the internal security officer. Their cards will also be perforated in two sections, A for the visitor and B for the internal security officer.

Workers who need to go outside of the center due to the type of work they have been assigned will be issued white cards which are valid for 30 days, beginning on the first day of the month and through

Civil Service Opens To Nisei

WASHINGTON, March 15--The Civil Service commission has agreed to a WRA plan for putting Americans of Japanese ancestry into government civil service jobs. Tentative arrangements provide both civil service and FBI examinations, employment only in areas designated by military authorities, and assignment to work of a non-confidential nature.

WRA officials expect several thousand citizens of Japanese ancestry in the relocation camps to qualify.

The heads of each division will apply for renewal of the pass on the 26th day of each month. These work passes are not valid on Sundays and holidays unless so indicated on the reverse side. They are good only between sunrise and sundown.

For visits outside of the center, evacuees will be issued passes signed by Harlow M. Tomlinson or Stanley P. Adams. These will be taken up upon the evacuee's return to the center.

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TOWN HALL TALK

Last Saturday the Consumer Enterprises, Inc. held a general election among the shareholders to choose a board of directors.

On the ballot were 26 candidates for the nine board of directors and each of the nine directors was required to receive a majority of the votes cast before being elected.

To expect nine of the 26 candidates to receive a majority was absurd, but since the nominating committee of one delegate from each block refused to eliminate the lesser qualified candidates, all 26 nominees were put on the ballot.

Four of the candidates, Matsushi Naruse, Katsuki Iki, Tomotaro Nishizaki, and Tomasaburo Yuzawa received a majority of the 1,917 votes cast.

The votes received by the other 22 candidates ranged from slightly more than 100 to over 900. On Monday the original nominating committee met again to prepare the ballot for the run-off election.

Although a few of the delegates favored eliminating the candidates polling only a small vote, some unreasonable delegates insisted that all 22 candidates who did not receive a majority be placed on the ballot again. And to add further to the muddle, they insisted that all "write-in" candidates also be placed on the ballot.

This will mean that there will be more than 25 candidates for the five remaining positions as board directors.

It is doubtful whether any of the candidates not able to poll a majority of the votes in the final election will be able to do any better when running against some opposition.

This could go on indefinitely until the members refuse to cast their votes.

Unless the nominating committee is willing to eliminate instead of increase the candidates, it may be wiser to select a new nominating committee.

GOVERNOR MAW VETOES REAL PROPERTY BILL

SALT LAKE CITY, March 17--Bowling to pressure exerted by agricultural processors, Gov. Herbert B. Maw recently vetoed a bill by the Utah legislature to bar aliens ineligible for US citizenship from acquiring real property in the state.

In his veto message, the Governor said:

"The bill is worded so as to include all Asiatics, if it becomes effective, our mines, the Chinese and Mexicans... will become ineligible to own land within the state...

"It is my belief that it would be most unwise for the Sovereign State of Utah to pass any legislation that would tend to disenfranchise these Asiatic people...

"The bill is so broad," the Governor said, "that it would prohibit Japanese aliens in War centers from cultivating and occupying lands...to make it impossible for them to work and harvest crops during the emergency."

The true parent of Betty S. Fujisaki to Minoru Yamaguchi was revealed at a surprise party held at the home of her sister, Shizu, 37-54, Saturday night.

Miss Fujisaki, formerly of Walnut Grove and Oakland, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Isuru Fujisaki. Kanagaki is a UC graduate and is now employed as a civil engineer at Popay, Utah. Prior to evacuation, he was working for the Farm Security administration in San Francisco.

His children are Mr. and Mrs. I. Masano and Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Wata. The couple plan to be married in April.

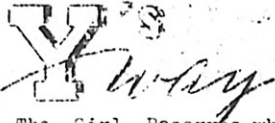

Frank M. Kramer, supervising inspector of the department, said:

"The State Department of Agriculture is bringing this important matter to the attention of the Federal authorities, and will do everything it can to get this vital agricultural machinery released to our farmers...."

Washington officials so far have denied governmental agencies the right to take steps to obtain possession of the machinery.

A preliminary check disclosed that 267 tractors, owned by Japanese, were idle.

Some 1200 acres have been turned over to these farmers. More people are negotiating for land on the project.

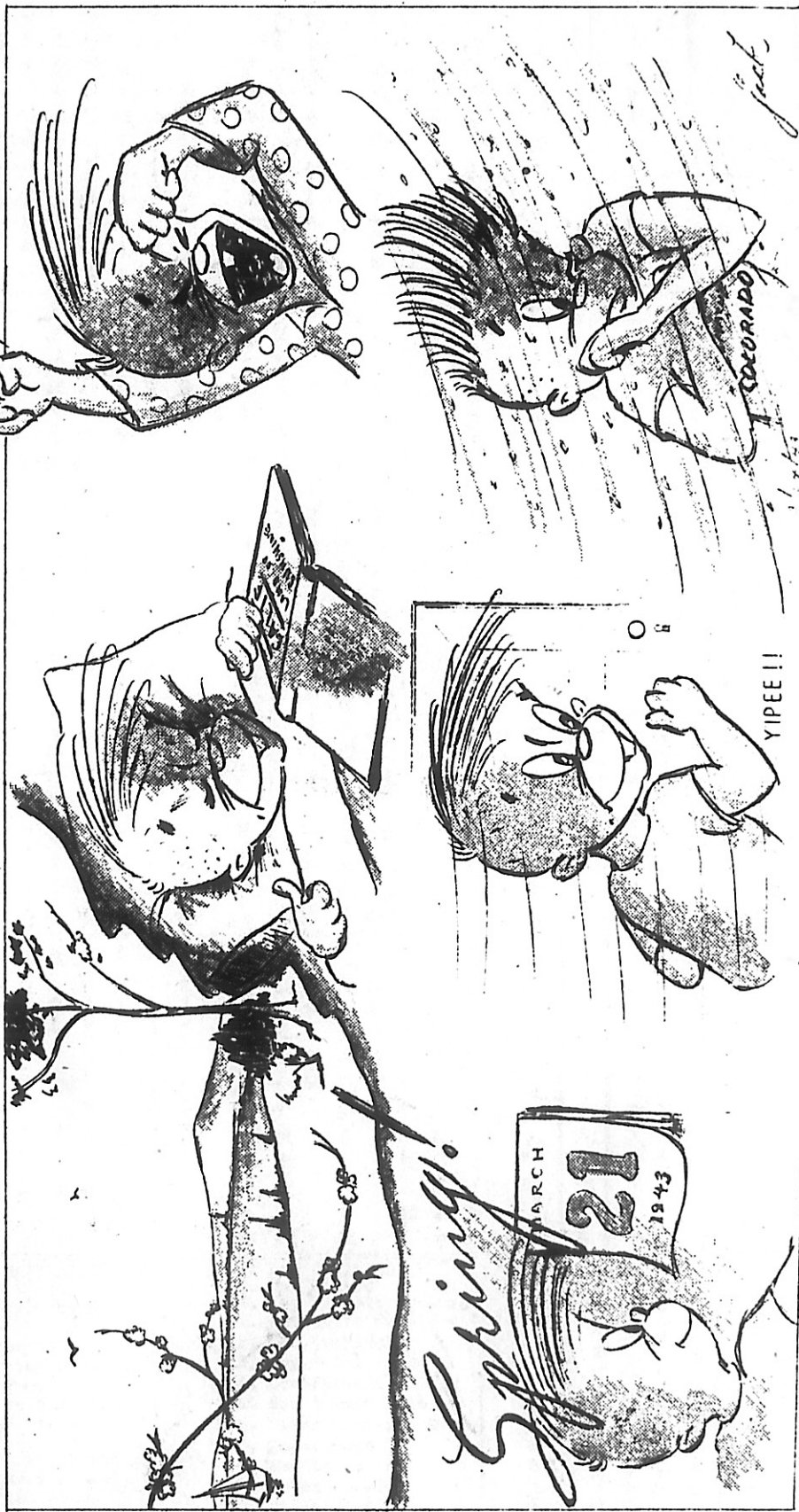
They will raise alfalfa, sugar beets, feed crops, and grain on the land that is located north of the Santa Fe railroad tracks.
