NEW SYSTEM OF PASS 15SUANCE ANNOUNCED

A new system for the issuance of gate passes will become effective on April 1, according to Project Director James G. Lindley. This system is to aid in standardizing and clarifying methods of handling gate passes for evacues and Japanese-Amer-

ican visitors.

Yellow cards will to for short-term absences; green, indefinite leave; blue, Japanese-American visitors; white, WRA workers and authorised visits outside of the center.

The leave officer will issue the yellow and green gate passes at the time of leave. Those will be divided in two sections. A to be retained by the guard at the gate, and B for the evacuee.

Visitors to the center must register with the internal security officer. Their cards will also be perforated in two sections, A for the visitor and B for the internal security officer.

Workers who need to go outside of the center due to the type of work they have been assigned will be issued white cards which are valid for 30 days, beginning on the first day of the month and through

rentative arrangements provide both civil service and 131 examinations, employment only in ureas designated by military authorities, and assignment to work of a non-confidential neture.

WA officials expect several thousand citizens of sepanese ancestry in the relocation camps to qualify. the last day of the calendar month.

The heads of each division will apply for renewal of the pass on the 26th day of each month. These work passes are not valid on Sundays and holidays unless so indicated on the reverse side. They are good only between sunrise and sundown.

For visits outside of the center, evacuoes will be issued passes signed by Harlow M. Tomlinson or Stanley P. Adams. These will be taken up upon the evacuee's return to the center.

TOWN HALL

Last Saturday the Consumer Enterprises, Inc. held a general election among the shareholders to choose a board of directors.

On the ballot were 26 candidates for the nine hoard of directors and each of the nine directors was required to receive a majority of the votes cast before being elected.

To expect nine of the 26 candidates to receive a majority was absurd, but since the nominating committee of one deleg te from each lock refused to eliminate the lesser qualified candidates, all 26 nominees were put on the ballot.

Four of the candidates, Matsushi Naruse, Katsuki Iki, Tomotaro Nishizaki, and Tomasaburo Yuzawa received a majority of the 1,917 votes cast.

The votes received by the other 22 candidates ranged from slightly more than 100 to over 900. On Monday the original nominating committee met again to prepare the ballot for the run-off election.

Although a few of the delegates favored eliminating the candidates polling only a small vote, some unreasonable delegates insisted that all 22 candidates who did not receive a majority be placed on the ballot again. And to add further to the muddle, they insisted that all "write-in" candidates also be placed on the ballot.

This will mean that there will be more than 25 candidates for the five remaining positions as board directors.

It is doubtful whether any of the candidates not able to poll a majority of the votes in the final election will be able to do any better when running against some opposition.

This could go on indefinitely until the members refuse to cast their votes.

Unless the nominating committee is willing to eliminate instead of increase the candidates, it may be wiser to select a new nominating committee.

SACRAMENTO, March 17--The California Dopartment of Agriculture last week began an inventory of Japanese-owned machinery, now rusting and idle on farms and in warehouses throughout California.

Frank M. Kramer, supervising inspector of the de-

partment, said:

"The State Department of Agriculture is bringing this important matter to the attention of the Federal authorities, and will do everything it can to got this vital agricultural machinery released to our farmers...".

Washington officials so far have denied governmental agencies the right to take steps to obtain possession of the machinery.

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
