PROJECT DIRECTOR MAY NOW ISSUE LEAVES

An administrative instruction giving project directors authority to issue indefinite leaves under specified circumstances, where leave clearance has not yet been granted, has been announced by Project Director James G. Lindley. Heretofore, indefinite leaves were granted only after the approval of the officials in Washington.

All applicants must have registered for leave clearance during the special military registration in February and March, answered "yes" to question 28 in the Army questionnaire, not have applied for repatriation or expatriation, not be a Shinto priest, and not be a paroled alien.

In addition, his application for leave clearance must have neither been denied nor suspended by the director in Washington. The leave will not be granted unless the project director has no reasonable ground to believe the issuance of indefinite leave would interfere with the war program or otherwise endanger the public peace and security. The applicant's proposed place of employment or residence must not be within the Eastern Defense command area. No conditions shall be attached to a leave so issued.

Application for leave clearance need not be made by a dependent who has not

yet reached his 17th birthday.

It shall be the responsibility of the project director to determine that the applicant has employment or other means of support at his destination, according to the instruction.

Curfew Law Is Questioned

WASHINGTON, DC, March 30 --The Supreme court was asked to pass on the constitutionality of a curfew imposed on west coast enemy aliens (this included American citizens of Japanese ancestry also) by Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense command.

The request to the Supreme court was presented in cases involving Minoru Yasui of Portland, and Gordon Kiyoshi Hirabayashi of Seattle, American citizens of Japanese ancestry.

"The question as to whether this exercise of the war power can be reconciled with traditional standards of personal liberty and freedom guaranteed by the constitution is most difficult," the Ninth Circuit court said in its application.

LARGE CROWD BIDS ALOHA TO HAWAII VOLUNTEERS

HONOLULU, March 29--Honolulu bade more than 2,600 Japanese-American soldiers a typical "Aloha" before probably the largest crowd in the city's history. Nearly 20,000 jammed the grounds of the military governor's mansion.

The volunteers will be transported to a training camp at Shelby, Miss.

Said Robert Horton, spe-

cial representative of Interior Secretary Ickes, to the volunteers:

"I don't worry much about the Japanese. Democracy is a form of government where a man can be a man... you can stand shoulder to shoulder with your fellow man...."

"Go out and fight for democracy... make this thing work."

NO CUFFS ON MEN'S TROUSERS, SAYS WPB

WASHINGTON, DC, March 25 --A proposal to put cuffs back on men's trousers was rejected after a discussion with the clothing industry, the WPB reported.

Frills and "useless" trimming on women's and men's sweaters and other knitted garments will be eliminated, it was also reported.

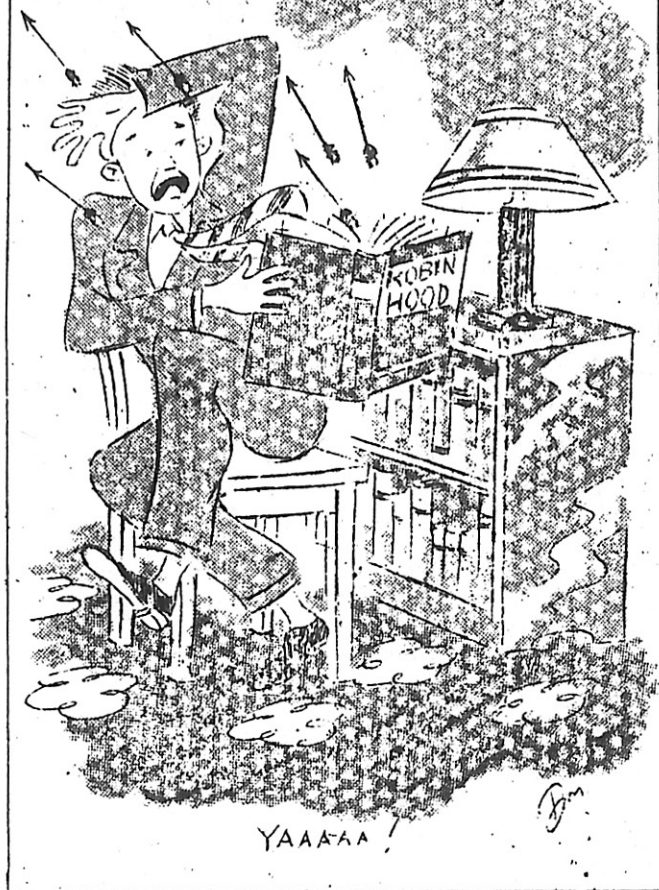
A coal truck caught fire in Block 7H recently, and a short circuit was given as the cause. No damage was reported as the fire department quickly had the flames under control.

Brush loves to play golf, and has broken the 80's several times. His love for Hawaiian music may be attributed to his birthplace, Hawaii.

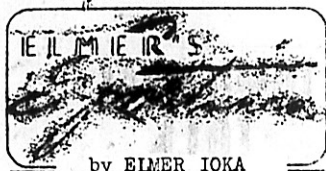

Ralph Smeltzer, director of the Brethren relocation hostel, left a very enlightening and encouraging message to those seeking outside employment. The hostel plan, pertaining to the evacuees, was first proposed in Manzanar the beginning of this year by Thomas Temple. He took 13 eligible persons to Chicago and within a week, most of them were employed; all were working after the second week. The immediate success and the soundness of the plan brought the prompt endorsement of WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

The hostel idea, briefly, is to provide a temporary place for job-applicants to stay and to aid them in every way possible in securing work. In this way the evacuee is relieved of many of the problems confronting him upon entering a strange city.

Smeltzer emphasized that the housing situation in Chicago is not acute because it is not a vital defense area; that the people are very tolerant toward the evacuees and show little racial discrimination; and that the Army's general draft program has left openings in all fields of work.

He cautioned against the idea of evacuees taking any kind of a job just to get out of camp and transferring to a more suitable job at the first opportune moment. Actual experiences have shown that those quitting their jobs after a few days have caused employers to harbor ill feeling toward the evacuees. The hostel system will overcome this because the job-applicants will have direct contact with their job possibilities and employers. This will then enable the employees to find something suitable to begin with.

The hostel idea seems the best yet conceived for those wishing to relocate; at least it should prove an incentive for the ones who have wanted an outside job and were hesitant about going. --Richard Toyama

Think Resettlement

Leave clearance can be issued at the discretion of the project director except in certain cases is the report that has come from Washington. This report, following word that the WRA will provide financial aid to workers needing it in re-establishing themselves, will speed up the resettlement of evacuees.

The inevitable delay experienced hitherto in obtaining leave clearance has been a big factor in the inability of evacuee and employer to come to terms. Local clearance and the hostel system now in operation should erase the obstacle of time and distance.

Any hesitancy on the part of the individuals because of monetary reasons should be eliminated with the promise of financial aid.

The sooner the young people break away from the economic protection afforded by the relocation centers and the sooner they resettle themselves into a normal American way of living, the better it will be for them.

Living a sheltered life within the center is taking away from the independence and the initiative of the evacuees.

The longer the stay within the center, the more difficult will be the readjustment.

Take advantage of the latest orders. Think resettlement constantly.
