The call is out for more farm workers. The farm project knows it has a tough fight on its hand in securing men to turn out for work, so the problem has been thrown into the laps of the block managers. They too realize that the going will not be easy, but they are doing their best.

Lucrative offers from the timber and railroad companies plus the WRA policy of relocation are rapidly draining the center's available manpower, especially the younger men. They are not interested because they intend to leave camp soon and many of the older men are already working.

The only solution seems to be to transfer labor from other departments to the farm project. Departments with more workers than necessary and units that can suspend work temporarily will be investigated. The carpenter shop, warehouse, and the landscaping department are a few examples.

The manpower in the lastnamed department should be put to immediate use. Landscaping can wait but planting and irrigating must be done now.

The second step is persuasion. The important job of the block managers is to bring the people face to face with the seriousness of the situation. They must emphasize that the farm project is the only productive department in camp and undeniably the most important. Vegetables are becoming increasingly scarce on the outside. In turn our share is decreasing.

By supporting the farm project we can overcome this shortage. In addition, it will mean that there will be a greater assortment of greens on our tables.

A project which benefits the entire center should be supported by the people.

JAPANESE EVACUEE BEGINS SENTENCE

FLORENCE, Ariz., April 4--Joe Tsugawa, 46, Japanese evacuee began serving a term of 15 to 25 years in the Arizona State prison for the second-degree murder of Jinkichi Nitao, 49, his neighbor at the Gila river relocation center.

Tsugawa pleaded guilty to the charge and said that he had beat Nitao to death with a hammer after having warned him repeatedly to stay away from his wife.

IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, April 2--Two employment services report that there are more jobs available to Japanese-Americans in the New York metropolitan area than there are applicants to fill them.

S. J. Sakairi, proprietor the Japanese-American Employment agency, declared approximately 85 per cent of the families here that discharged Japanese servants after Pearl Harbor are once more seeking Japanese employees.

The editorial further stated that, "Since this internment of American-born citizens is wholly extraconstitutional and justified only by military necessity, nothing could be more incongruous or illogical than to try to end it by a legal measure.

"Release of these people," the editorial said, "is going on now as the FBI separates the Yoyal from the disloyal. This release may not be rapid enough to suit our Kentucky counselor, but he should nemember that under the circumstances the separation is not easy. The matter had better i be left in the hands now engaged with it."

MILITARY SERVICE LOYAL JAPANESE

. WASHINGTON, DC, April 2 -- Compulsory military, service for loyal Japanese-Americans in relocation centers, with the Army deciding which individuals are trustworthy, appeared probable.

The idea of requiring all of the evacuees of military age to report for induction seemed likely to be adopted by the War department, following a conference between Secretary of War McCloy and Senator Chandler of Kentucky, chairman of a senate military

affairs committee group investigating the handling of evacuees.

The Senator thinks that the WRA and the Japanese settlements can be abolished "in time but not right away."

He urged that all the Japanese who will volunteer or who can be drafted be put in the Army; that the disloyal be imprisoned in concentration camps; and that the loyal who are able to work be certified by the FBI and allowed to take jobs:


