PASSES ARE BANNED

The issuance of all passes is temporarily suspended, Project Director James G. Lindley announced.

At a meeting in Director Lindley's office Thursday morning, attended by representatives of the various evacuee organizations as well as the administrative staff, it was decided that it is advisable for people of Japanese ancestry to remain in the center due to the announcement of the execution of American aviators in Japan.

"I'm sure that everyone will understand that we are taking this action for the best interests of the residents of Amache," Lindley stated.

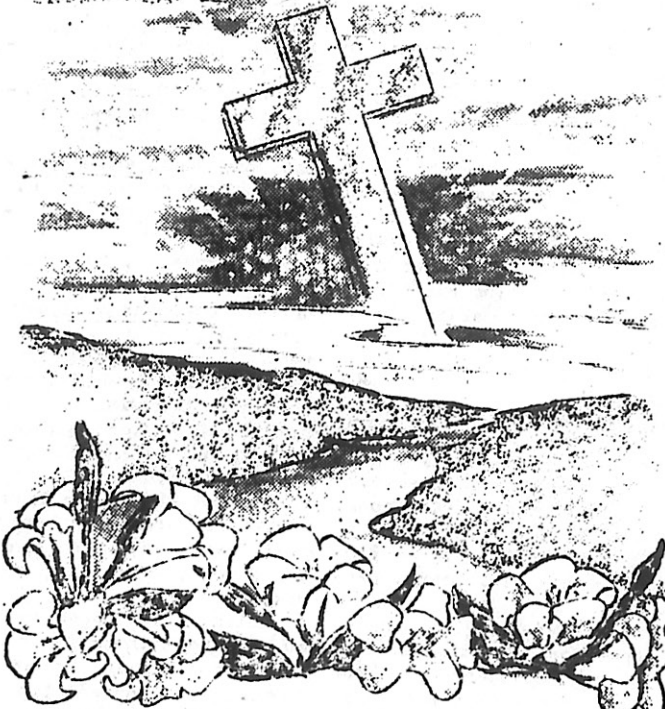

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TOWN HALL TALK

To Be Pitied

Recently Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt publicly took a stand against the return of the evacuees to the West coast, declaring "a Jap's a Jap" whether he is a citizen or not.

The first reaction to these words was one of anger that a man in his position would make such a statement. But, on second thought, he is a man to be pitied.

He opened his mouth in direct opposition to the War department policy of rectifying the wrong inflicted upon the nisei by opening the armed service to them. And less than a week after his public statement, he was made to look a fool by signing a proclamation, in accordance with the War department policy, allowing freedom of movement in the Western Defense command to nisei soldiers on furlough.

His actions and statements are of a man desperately trying to justify a mistake he made--and which the nation is beginning to recognize as a mistake--that of mass evacuation.

He had allowed economic pressure groups looking after their own interests to influence his decision for evacuation, and now, instead of admitting his error, his frantic attempts to cover up are making him ridiculous.

Pity him and don't waste your anger.

In addition, there are several jobs for domestics --single and couples.

After making an extensive study of job conditions in the Chicago area, Joe Hikida, former SF Japanese association secretary, and Mitsushi Onishi, LA merchant, addressed the block managers at a special meeting held recently.

"Although all lines of trade are gradually opening up for qualified nisei, at present about 80 per cent of the calls are for domestics in well-to-do families paying...from \$100 to \$200 for couples," Hikida said.

While in Chicago, Hikida visited a nursery which employs some 25 nisei from the bay area, and a mail-order concern which has hired about 20 nisei workers.

He revealed, too, that those interested in the nursery business will have little difficulty in getting 75 cents an hour or more. He also contacted a bottle factory that can use up to 60 workers. Those with technical experience, especially mechanics, may earn about \$200 a month or work on a percentage basis that averages more than \$70 a week, according to Hikida.

Onishi discouraged evacuees from investing too much capital in unknown territory. Unpredictable weather has bankrupted many a pioneer farmer in the state, he pointed out.

The case of a Wisconsin tomato farmer was given as illustration. Several evacuees pooled their resources, rented, improved, and planted tomato beds. However, after all preparations had been made, pressure from the surrounding communities forced them to leave that territory. They are at present looking for jobs to keep them going.

This was one time when the evacuees failed to ascertain whether or not the community sentiment was favorable toward Japanese settlement. The WRA has been devoting much time to this angle, and evacuees should take advantage of their judgment.

NISEI SOLDIERS MAY TRAVEL IN COASTAL AREA

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18--American soldiers of Japanese descent on furlough were granted freedom of movement in the states of the Western Defense command--the first relaxation of barriers erected against the Japanese following Pearl Harbor.

Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt signed the proclamation granting the privilege, although it was only last week that he publicly took a stand against the return of Japanese to the West coast.

AMERICAN FLAGS MADE BY NISEI

"I hope I'll make the flag that marches through Tokyo," declared Mrs. Hoshiye Abe, a worker in a flag manufacturing firm in Denver.

"With a new US policy toward Americans of Japanese ancestry, many nisei are given a chance to show their loyalty...Volunteers are lining up to serve in Army combat teams...other volunteers are manning machines to build the weapons for victory," the SF Chronicle stated recently.

FREEZE WORKERS IN ESSENTIAL INDUSTRIES

WASHINGTON, April 17--The government froze more than 27 million workers in essential activities in their current employment, effective midnight April 17. Instigated by Paul V. McNutt, war manpower chief, the order controls earnings by making it impossible for a worker--man or woman--to leave his present job in any of the 35 essential activities groups in order to take a higher-paying job with another employer.

The war manpower commission's list of essential activities include production of combat materials, including maintenance and repair of such items; production of certain industrial and pharmaceutical chemicals; all communica-

LOS ANGELES, April 18--The rights of the Japanese evacuated by military order were upheld by Division Two of the District Court of Appeal which reversed a Superior Court judgment ordering that a

'GO FOR BROKE' IS THEIR MOTTO

CAMP SHELBY, Miss., April 16--A military unit of 2,500 Japanese-Americans from Hawaii, who traveled 4000 miles to learn to fight for the country of their birth against the land of their ancestors, are now encamped in southern Mississippi.

With memories of Pearl Harbor behind them, they told the world of their determination to go all-out for victory with their motto, "Go For Broke."

These men, with 2,500 other nisei from the continental United States, will form a combat unit of infantry, field artillery, engineers, and its own medical personnel.

Said their commander, Col. Charles W. Pence, "Each of you is a symbol of loyalty--the loyalty of the Japanese-American."

tion services and production of communication equipment; and agricultural activities designated as essential to the war program.

The list also includes the processing or manufacturing of basic foods, including fresh, canned, and otherwise preserved; production of apparel for the armed forces and work clothing; and the production, maintenance, and repair of all equipment and facilities necessary in the production of essential war materials. In addition, the commission, in separate rulings, has held that certain peculiar local needs may require classification of an activity as essential, such as laundries, certain forms of transportation, hotels, and restaurants.

Japanese lessee be held to his contract despite the fact that he had been removed from the district.

The action was originally brought to the Superior court by the trustees for the estate of Anna D. Brown against Y. Oshiro, who held a lease on a hotel building on the corner of First and Los Angeles Sts., the lease to expire in 1944.

In the Superior court, Judge Ben R. Ragan held that the contract was still valid.

The higher court reversed the judgment of the Superior court, granting a new trial holding that the military order removing Oshiro from his place of business was beyond his control; hence, terminated the contract.

Attorney Ray L. Smith, representing Oshiro, pointed out that this test case will affect many leases and contracts between Japanese and property owners.

2,571 Evacuees Leave Centers

DENVER, April 17--More than 2,571 Japanese have left the relocation centers on indefinite leaves to take jobs in cities and towns throughout the East and Middle West, reports John R. Ward, AP writer. Another 2,942 have been granted leaves and plan to check out as soon as employment arrangements are completed.

George Noda, from the Granada relocation center is now working in the administrative offices of the War Labor board in Denver. He said:

"This rehabilitation program means a lot to us...it goes farther than fancy phrases to show that you get a square deal in this country. I am determined to make good."

At a Denver company, which formerly turned out incubators for chicks, 28 Japanese are engaged in making ammunition crates. Several nisei women are nurses at Colorado General hospital.

THREE APPOINTED TO FILL VACANCIES

Samuel Gordon, adult education head; E. H. Run-corn, associate enterprises superintendent; and Jack G. Bohon, fiscal accountant, have been appointed by the Council to fill the three remaining positions on the center Judicial commission.

Seiishiro Fujioka, Ituge Okubo, Saburo Cujow, Shuichi Sesaki, and Oski S. Taniwaki are the other members of the commission.

WRA 1944 BUDGET UP FOR APPROVAL

The 1944 budget for WRA is now on its way to the House Appropriations committee, after being reviewed by the Bureau of Budget, which has recommended a budget of \$48,170,000. The WRA places a ceiling of 251 on the Washington staff, 308 on the field offices, and 2,073 on the projects.

PIONEER STAFF MEMBERS LEAVE

Yoshiaki Ogita, Richard Toyama, and Elmer Ioka left Amache and the PIONEER staff this week, the first two for the Chicago hotel, and the latter for Boulder.

SELECTIVE SERVICE REVISES DRAFT CLASSIFICATIONS

WASHINGTON, April 17--The War Manpower commission revised the Selective Service classifications as follows:

1-A--Available for military service.

1-A-O--Conscientious objector available for non-combatant military service.

1-C--Member of land or naval forces.

2-A--Man holding job in occupation essential to civilian economy.

2-B--Man holding essential job in war industry.

2-C--Single man in agriculture.

3-A--Father with bona fide family relationship.

3-C--Man with dependents and engaged in agriculture.

3-D--Man whose induction would cause extreme hardship and privation to a wife, child, or parent with whom he maintains a bona fide family relationship.

4-A--Man 45 years old or over.

4-B--Official, deferred by law.

4-C--Neutral alien requesting deferment or alien not acceptable to armed forces.

4-D--Minister of religion or divinity student.

4-E--Conscientious objector unavailable for military service of any sort.

4-F--Man physically, mentally, or morally unfit.

4-H--Man 38 or over, but under 45.

FIGURES RELEASED ON OUTSIDE LIVING COSTS

The cost of living now in most of the middle western cities, where a number of Amache residents are expected to relocate in private employment, is lower than in San Francisco, according to figures revealed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, US Department of Labor. In Kansas City, Indianapolis, and Denver, living costs have not yet gone up as high as those which prevailed in San Francisco in December, 1941.

A worker's income of \$150 a month in San Francisco in December, 1941, is taken as the basis on which the figures were prepared. In order to buy the same quantities of goods and services which this \$150 income would buy in San Francisco in December, 1941, the worker required an income of \$167.54. This budget is for a family of four persons and takes into account food, clothing,

rent, utilities; house furnishings, and miscellaneous goods and services.

To maintain the same standard of living in February, 1943, in other selected cities, the following incomes would be required: Chicago, \$163.41; Cincinnati, \$141.75; Cleveland, \$160.36; Detroit, \$163.52; Indianapolis, \$146.77; Milwaukee, \$157.23; Kansas City, \$142.84; Minneapolis, \$156.44; New York, \$168.28; St. Louis, \$156.19; Denver, \$147.72; and Washington, DC, \$166.52.

SCHOOL HEADS PRESENT PROBLEMS AT MEETING

"No American-born citizen of Japanese ancestry has ever been convicted or charged with any act of sabotage against the American government in either the United States or Hawaii," declared Paul J. Terry, education head, before the Las Animas chamber of commerce last week. Terry was accompanied by Herbert K. Walther, junior high principal, Coradell Crain, junior high music instructor, and four of the latter's students.

Terry explained that all Japanese were moved from the coast, not because any of them had been proven disloyal, but rather because military authorities could not, in case of an invasion, distinguish

between an American-born Japanese and a foreign invader or fifth columnist.

Talks by Terry and Walther were followed by an open forum, in which questions were asked by the chamber of commerce members.

The girls, under the direction of Julia Prescott and Emiko Hinoki, will take care of one-half acre of the lot, while the boys,

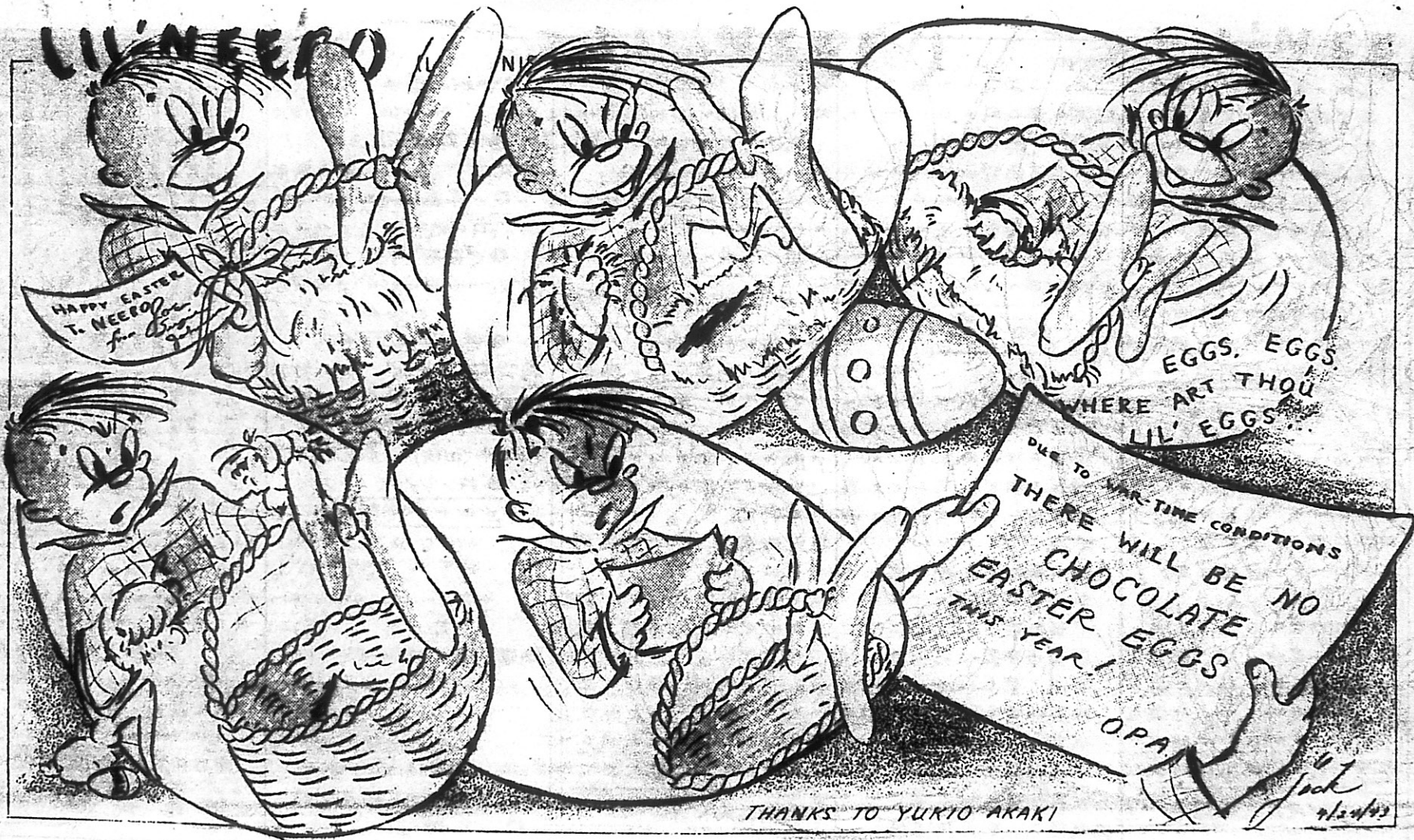

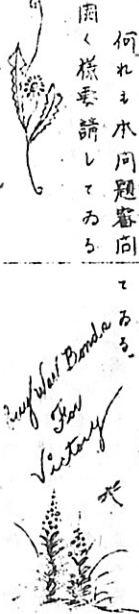
司法省の見解に待つ
