Farm Plans To Recruit 200 CHARTER AMENDMENT VOTE IS SCHEDULED

Tentative plans were made for the recruiting of nearly 200 farm workers in the next three weeks, at a meeting of the representatives of the blocks and the farm section Thursday evening at Town hall.

A tour of the project farm will be conducted next week in order to increase the interest in this program. It was felt by the group that those with farm experience or with an interest in the farm would feel an urge to get out and help if they actually visited the field and saw the progress made.

Meetings will be conducted in each block to impress upon the residents the importance of the farm program and the acuteness of the labor shortage.

Representatives in the block will make direct contact with unemployed persons to urge them to work on the farm.

The meeting was opened by Project Director James G. Lindley, who urged the people to make the "apathetic...conscious that they are a minority group here and are not popular." He asked the old and the young to forget their squabbles as "the farm need you both" and "the center is going to need the farm."

John Spencer, new chief of the agriculture division, said that people who pass the farm are watching its progress with interest. "Mary," he declared, "expect and some hope it will fail. This is a challenge to all of you."

A report on the progress to date of the vegetable screenings were made by Roy Nakatani who introduced each of the unit supervisors. Henry Shimizu reported on the poultry unit and George Miyake on the beef cattle and feed crops.

In accordance with instructions from the Washington WRA giving the right to hold elective office, the Community Council has decided that Article II, Section 2-A, shall be amended to read as follows:

"The representative shall be any person, twenty-one years of age or over, elected by the voters of his block by secret ballot for a term of six months and shall be eligible for

re-election."

Residents are asked to vote for the amendment Monday in their respective block offices, which will remain open from 1 to 7 p.m. The amendment will become effective immediately if approved by a majority vote.

SHIG HASHII IS COUNCIL HEAD

Shig Hashii was unanimously elected chairman of the Council Monday, replacing Katsuki Iki. Harry Naka is the new vice chairman.

George Marumoto, representing District II and Thomas Saito, District V, were elected as members of the Executive committee of the Council.

No Need For Alarm

Ted Uyeno, writer of the Lancer's column in the Pacific Citizen, whose impressions of Chicago was recently carried in the PIONEER, writes as an aftermath of the Marengo affair:

"The incident at Marengo is only a minor problem confronting the Americans of Japanese descent. There is no need to become alarmed. Flare-ups are bound to pop up from time to time. In spite of these adversities, the nisei must courageously face realities. We are at war, and people are going to be swayed emotionally, regardless of facts. When this war comes to an end, the majority of Americans of Japanese ancestry must not be caught in the relocation centers. They must make readjustments, relocate themselves to new communities, and be prepared to meet the difficulties of the post-war period, which are bound to come."

WORKERS MAY APPLY FOR EMERGENCY AID

Sugar beet workers and others who are unable to pay for essential medical care or who need other emergency assistance should go to the nearest local welfare bureau, John J. O. Moore, public welfare counselor said.

Aid to evacuees is administered by the local welfare boards under an arrangement between the Social Security board and WRA.

Since the agreement with the Social Security board is definitely applicable to persons on leave from WRA centers, it is assumed that it is not necessary for an evacuee to establish the usual legal residence in a community to receive public welfare assistance.

Evacuees who are not certain where to apply may contact the local consular agencies or WRA field office or, if in Colorado, apply to the county public welfare office which is usually located at the county court house.

State Demands Investigation

WASHINGTON, May 4--Rep. Frank A. Barrett of Wyoming proposed that the Dies committee investigate conditions at the Mt. Mountain relocation center.

He told the house that Wyoming is up in arms over charges published in a Denver paper.

"...An investigation is being made by the authorities of the WRA, but we are convinced that this will be another whitewash. This is 'sabotage' of the war effort," said Barrett.

BILL HOSOKAWA IS REPORTER

Bill Hosokawa, former editor of the Mt. Mountain Sentinel and columnist for the Pacific Citizen, is now a reporter on the Inter-city News, Fairmont Station, Mo., daily. He replaced a member of the staff who had been called to the Army.

When a subscriber called to verify the report that they had "a Jap working there," the editors replied, "We have an American citizen whose parents happened to be born in Japan."

Safe Return To Coast Seen

WASHINGTON, May 3--Feeling in high government quarters that loyal Japanese aliens and citizens can be returned safely to the Pacific coast was seen in new assurances from Assistant Secretary of War McCloy that "no arbitrary decisions" will be made by Federal authorities studying proposals for modifying the relocation program.

McCloy told W. G. Herron, representative of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce that "there is a place in California and elsewhere for loyal Japanese."

"I also feel that if the problem is dealt with, it may greatly improve the situation which previously existed in this country with regard to the Japanese."

NAVAL STUDENTS AT BOULDER WORK HARD

BOULDER, May 4--The Navy wants 1000 women to apply for the Japanese language school here--but it warns them that they'll have no easy life.

Students are expected to study a minimum of 13

hours a day, and during the year they spend 1,250 hours in classes, 3000 hours in preparation, and 250 hours taking examinations, according to reports prepared by the Naval public relations officers in Washington. In one year, they are expected to learn as much Japanese as they would learn in 18 years of a standard college course.

The language school was originally established in Berkeley in 1941 but was moved to the University of Colorado at Boulder in June, 1942, when it became necessary to remove the Japanese-American instructors from the Pacific coast defense zone.

LA TIMES CARTOON SHOWS 'LOYALTY'

On the editorial page of the LA Times recently was a cartoon by Bruce Russell showing a comic figure with a huge pistol titled "Jap Loyalty" pointed at his head saying, "See, not loaded!"

The lapel of the coat worn by the figure was adorned with a button labeled "Softhearted Nisei Return' Plans." The cartoon was captioned, "That's the Kind That Goes Off."

NISEI DOES GOOD DEED

A nisei girl from Poston, formerly of Los Angeles who is now working for WRA in Washington, got her picture in the paper and some favorable publicity the other day as a result of a good turn done a WAVE.

Miss Sachi Anraku found a wallet containing \$66 on a downtown Washington Street. After considerable difficulty she located the owner, Seaman Geraldine Sexton, and returned the wallet to her, refusing to accept a reward.

The Washington Star quoted Miss Anraku as saying that she had done "only what any other American would do in similar circumstances." The picture showed her returning the wallet to the WAVE.

NISEI FORCED TO QUIT CHICAGO JOB

Following complaints made by Don Burrows, business manager of the Auto Mechanics union, local 701, a nisei employed as a mechanic by a Chicago automobile dealer agreed to quit the job, according to a recent issue of the Chicago Tribune.

Unless stricter supervision of released internees is made, Burrows stated that he will permit no more of them to work in shops controlled by his union.

Employer Carl Peterson, whose shop has been picketed for the last four years, said that he had been informed that the man was a Chinese-American.

Thumbail SKETCHES

To the average person, the idea of having the responsibility of managing a half-million-dollar-a-year business for the welfare of six or seven thousand people would seem monstrous. But that is the burden placed on the shoulders of Kenichi Shintani, 9L-3C, last month when the Consumer Enterprises board of directors elected him general manager of the co-op stores.

The management of a large-scale business is a difficult task, but not so for Shintani, who was president and general manager of the Oka Produce company, besides being part-owner of the Garden Basket Markets -- a chain of 15 stores. These two LA firms had a financial turnover of three-quarter million dollars yearly. They employed approximately 185 workers and had business dealings with all nationalities.

The foregoing facts may give some conception of Shintani's managerial experience and ability in big business. Like the majority of issei, he worked his way up the ladder in the world of commerce. He arrived in Seattle at the age of 15, then immediately went to Hollywood, where he acquired his primary and secondary education. He also attended the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena for two years.

He later became a fisherman off the shores of Terminal Island. It was there that he met the partner with whom he started the produce business.

The father of two children, Shintani is a conversational person. He is 41 years old, 5 feet 2½ inches in stature, and weighs 120 pounds. In his leisure time, he loves to play golf, goh, and mahjong.

His friend, Henry H. Tsuno, states, "The board of directors couldn't have selected a better man. Ken is an issei, but he is so Americanized he has the ability to meet and understand both issei and nisei."

MAY CHANGE REQUEST FOR REPATRIATION

Residents of Amache who have asked to be repatriated, or who have indicated acceptance or declination of repatriation as a result of lists of names submitted by the Japanese government, may now change their requests if they wish by filing the proper form with Project Director James G. Lindley. Copies may be obtained at the leave office of Willis Hanson.

The WRA cannot guarantee the exchange of evacuees applying for repatriation. It can only place the applications in the hands of the State department for consideration in the exchange negotiation, according to a recent press release.

Said Project Director Lindley, "While each evacuee is free to decide for himself whether he wants to apply for exchange to Japan, the decision should not be arrived at hastily or lightly. The indivi-

CIVIL AERONAUTICS' POLICY REVISED

The War department recently revised its original policy and will now permit the Civil Aeronautics administration to issue identification cards to citizens of Japanese ancestry under certain conditions, according to E. M. Rowalt, acting WRA director.

Evacuees previously denied airmen identification cards or now interested in applying for them may make applications with the CAA. However, the applicant must be an American citizen and must never have been in Japan, although in exceptional cases the latter point may be waived.
