A step designed to release more workers for the center farm has been taken by the sanitation department which this week cut down the number of stokers employed. Hereafter, residents will be allowed to use the laundries from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., and the baths and showers, from 12 noon to 10 p.m. only.

SEEK SIX INSTRUCTORS

Six native-speaking Japanese, preferably men, are being sought by J. M. Cowan, director, Intensive Language Program of the American Council of Learned Societies, to serve as teaching assistants. Applicants should not be older than 25 years of age, but the absolute age limit is set at 30 years.

Persons accepted will undergo a training period at Yale university, and will receive \$150 per month; plus travel expenses to Yale, the salary to hold during the training period.

The three important requirements are fluency in speaking the standard Tokyo dialect -of the Japanese language, education, and personality. Reading and writing ability in the Japanese language, while desirable, is by no means essential, said Cowan.

Persona interested in these positions are asked to contact the employment office immediately.

PUEBLO JOURNAL INMATES GET BETTER GRUB

Editorially stating that several thousand inmates (in a Montana concentration camp) are getting better grub and more of it than is being doled out to's majority of American families by the same government that is pampering the Japs in this and other camps, the Pueblo Journal, suggested that Congress refuse to make appropriations to continue such unpatriotic and inconsistent policies, in a recent edition.

SEGREGATION OF JAPANESE STARTS

WASHINGTON, May 14 -- Separation of Japanese and Japanese American evacuees the basis of hostility or loyelty to the United States has been started, Dillon S. Myer, director of the VRA, announced in outlining plans for gradual "liquidation" of camps in which more than 100,000 Pacific coast residents are confined.

The WRA heed forecast eventual release of most of the persons now in the 10 centers but declined to commit himself on allowing evacuees to return to the Pacific coast.

CURFEW LAW

COURT DECISION

WASHINGTON, May 11 -- Defending military regulations imposing a West coast curfew on all persons of Japanese ancestry and excluding them from designeted areas, Solicitor General Cherles Fahy told the Supreme court that it was "imperative that those charged with the defense of our shores take adequate protective measures egainst a possible invesion."

"The exigencies of war may demand the imposition restraints that would be unwarranted in times of "Inpeace," said Fahy. deed, an individual may be required to give up his freedom and lay down his life. The ourfew and the exclusion measures are certainly less drastic than compulsory military service."

Prosecuting Attorney E. F. Bernard of Portland asserted that "the curfew law was the first assault on the constitutional rights

KEN NISHIMOTO IS FIRST WASHINGTON DC VOLUNTEER

The first nisei in Weshington, DC, to volunteer for the special combet team, Ken Mishimoto, formerly of Stockton and Denver, recently received much publicity in newspapers of the nation's capitel -- "Japanese American volunteered because it is the least I can do for my country." The father of two children, Nishimoto formerly worked in the Denver WRA office.

PATIENTS MAY BE REMOVED

LOS ANGELES Mey 16 -- Cooperative action on the part of the Army and Los Angeles county to get 175 tubercular Japanese now in La Crescenta and Monrovia sanitoriums, removed to points farther inland, appeared imminent. .

The growing need for incressed hospital accommodetions in the Los Angeles area, and the acute shortage of such facilities are given as reasons for the proposed steps.

Justices Jackson and Black asked questions as to whether the court gould set aside the decisions of military leaders, as to what constitutes military necessity.
Asked Jackson:

"... Is it beyond the · military leader's power to reach a judgment ... and to exclude these people?'

Co-Attorney A. L. Wirin of Los Angeles replied "that exclusion would be warrented only under the most extreme circumstances, and those circumstances did not exist on the Pacific coast."

"The orders were carried . out only against persons of Japanese descent," added Wirin.

Meanwhile, patients desiring eye examinations for classes must see the medical doctor first during general clinic hours, and thereupon receive his date and time of appointment for the Optometry clinic from the out-patient receptionist. If the appointment date cannot be fulfilled, the ratient should notify the Optometry clinic ahead of time.

All repairing and issuing of glasses has been moved to 6G-1F, the new location of the Optometry division.

Willis J. Hanson, project leave officer, reports a new plan which will make it possible for more evacuees to leave the center on indefinite leave before receiving definite job of-

a WRA relocation Where officer feels that he could place more people than are now coming into his area, he supplies the project leave officer with information about the number of workers needed, the types of jobs open, wages, hous-ing, cost of living, and other facts about the community. The project director is then authorized to issue indefinite leave to evacuees whose skills fit the request made by the relocation officer. Upon arrival in the community, evacuees are helped by relocation supervisors and the local officer of the US Employment service to locate specific jobs.

Leave is issued only when there is every likelihood that the applicant will be employed quickly. Transportation and early living expenses are paid by WRA on the same basis as to persons leaving the center to accept specific jobs.

AUTO MECHANICS SHOULD REGISTER

Automobile mechanics with a minimum of two full years of such work experience are urged to register for possible outside employment in this field with Marvin W. Lawson at the US Employment service branch office, 6G information office.

Said Lawson, "Persons who have work experience in trades and occupations in which there is a shortage of workers should register so that we may serve you better when offers of employment for such skills arise."

Thumbrail SKETCHES

The youngest principal in a Colorado high school in 1926 was Herbert K. Walther, Amache junior high principal, who was 19 years old. Even now, he is among the youngest school heads.

Walther embarked on a ministerial career by attending St. Johns college, Winfield, Kans., but later decided he would be more valuable as a teacher. Since then, he has established the enviable record of 15 years of teaching in Coloredo. His teaching has not been confined to secondary schools as he has instructed at every college in this state.

He attained his college education by working his way from a procery store clerk to a printer's "devil." Subsequently he received his BA in classical lenguage and music at Denver U., and later acquired his MA in education at the same institution.

For the past 1 0 years he was the secretary of the Colorado Music Educators association. He is now the president. Music-minded, he is recognized as one of the foremost music instructors in this state. As a youth, he played in dance bands.

Today, he is one of the ablest orators in this center. He has done an immeasurable amount of work in the resettlement program by acquainting outside people with the evacuees.

His immediate ambition is "to become a member of the commission for post-war education in Europe." Probably John Addington Symond's verse, "The Days That Are To Be," best describes his philosophy:

These things shall be-a loftier rase

Than e'er the world hath known shell rise

With fleme of freedom in the souls,

And light of knowledge in their eyes.
