SANITATION

Rules Given

A step designed to release more workers for the center farm has been taken by the sanitation department which this week cut down the number of stokers employed. Hereafter, residents will be allowed to use the laundries from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., and the baths and showers, from 12 noon to 10 p.m. only.

SEEK SIX INSTRUCTORS

Six native-speaking Japanese, preferably men, are being sought by J. M. Cowan, director, Intensive Language Program of the American Council of Learned Societies, to serve as teaching assistants. Applicants should not be older than 25 years of age, but the absolute age limit is set at 30 years.

Persons accepted will undergo a training period at Yale university, and will receive \$150 per month, plus travel expenses to Yale, the salary to hold during the training period.

The three important requirements are fluency in speaking the standard Tokyo dialect of the Japanese language, education, and personality. Reading and writing ability in the Japanese language, while desirable, is by no means essential, said Cowan.

Persons interested in these positions are asked to contact the employment office immediately.

REDUCE GAS ALLOTMENT

In compliance with suggestions made by Guy M. Springer, district manager of the Office of Defense Transportation, who has made a check-up visit to Amache, reduced allotments of gasoline and mileage have been put into effect by the center's transportation division.

The new gasoline allowance is 9,100 gallons per month for the next quarter year; the mileage allowance is to be 81,833 miles per month. Gasoline previously allowed per month was 15,000 gallons, and 115,000 miles was allotted monthly previous to the new orders.

This is approximately a 40 per cent reduction in both mileage and fuel, and serves as notice that no

3 Sentenced

Charged with beating up an employee of the co-op shoe store, three center youths, Ken Muranaga, George Uriyu, and Kow Takesako, were sentenced to 60 days in the county jail at Lamar this week, according to Police Chief Marlow M. Tomlinson.

They were reported to have assaulted Henry Kajiooka, shoe clerk, Saturday night, because he had named them and two other juveniles as having stolen a pair of shoes from the co-op store that same afternoon.

The youths called out Kajiooka, who was at a dance, and demanded to know why he had told the police about the theft. Upon Kajiooka's reply that "it was his duty," they turned on him and beat him to the ground.

On being taken before the justice of peace in Lamar, Tuesday, the boys pleaded guilty to the charges made.

More than 340 evacuees have left Amache since May 1, bringing the center's total number of leaves issued to 1,225. The local population is now 6,509, according to Project Director James G. Lindley.

Letter

TO THE EDITOR

(All letters written to the editor must be no more than 250 words.)

TO THE EDITOR:

There is now an urgent drive to collect flocks of creatures known as evacuees of Amache to putter about on the farm. But the so-called drivers who manipulate these creatures do not seem to know that even evacuees have stomachs and feelings, just as much as they...Not even a tractor will run on an empty stomach and how can an evacuee do any sort of farm field work...with meals that are actually two pancakes, a cup of coffee and a small half of a canned peach... Also, these creatures, the Japs...are too good to be put to work on the farm for such tremendous wages as \$16 a month. Only a baby's handful of the total Amache evacuee population receive \$19 a month, the top salary for any Jap evacuee.

The most puzzling thing is how can these chair polishers who sit behind their glistening desks and try

to figure ways and means to present their motives so they sound sky high, ultra beautiful and strike the very nucleus of the listener or reader--one cannot help but wonder if they know that the evacuee is one like them with a stomach and feelings....

All the trumpeting now done cannot convince any evacuee that "farmers" cannot work heartily with such existing wages and with such food; especially with grand-scale strikes...by highly paid workers outside...wartime camps. Something really ought to be done to improve the food and salary.

AN EVACUEE

Ed note--Evacuees are being urged to work on the farm so that we will not have to go hungry. Our food is being purchased as a domestic consumer--we do not have an Army rating on priority. In the face of existing shortages, this means that we will have to produce in order to insure ourselves of eating. More than 40 per cent of the center workers hold \$19 jobs.

JAPANESE RESETTLERS FEATURED BY NEWS

"A carload of 40 Japanese Americans--bland, philosophical, complaining, yet reasonable--citizens of the US, intelligent and well-dressed, came into Denver...with their families...to be relocated in agricultural and other jobs in the Colorado area," wrote John Stephenson, news writer, in a recent issue of the Rocky Mt. News.

He mentioned that many were gradually leaving the various centers to resettle in Colorado and other adjoining states. He quoted Herold S. Choate, relocation supervisor of the Denver territory, as saying:

"...A year ago there was eminent cause for complaint among many loyal Japanese Americans but we just couldn't do otherwise. I know that many of

them suffered, but again we couldn't do otherwise. Now I think their cause for complaint is less. We are gradually, as fast as we can, trying to put them into their former occupations in other areas, and lead them into normal lives...."

Pictures of the evacuees were also shown.

SEGREGATION OF JAPANESE STARTS

WASHINGTON, May 14--Separation of Japanese and Japanese American evacuees on the basis of hostility or loyalty to the United States has been started, Dillon S. Myer, director of the WRA, announced in outlining plans for gradual "liquidation" of camps in which more than 100,000 Pacific coast residents are confined.

The WRA head forecast eventual release of most of the persons now in the 10 centers but declined to commit himself on allowing evacuees to return to the Pacific coast.

CURFEW LAW

COURT DECISION

WASHINGTON, May 11--Defending military regulations imposing a West coast curfew on all persons of Japanese ancestry and excluding them from designated areas, Solicitor General Charles Fahy told the Supreme court that it was "imperative that those charged with the defense of our shores take adequate protective measures against a possible invasion."

"The exigencies of war may demand the imposition of restraints that would be unwarranted in times of peace," said Fahy. "Indeed, an individual may be required to give up his freedom and lay down his life. The curfew and the exclusion measures are certainly less drastic than compulsory military service."

Prosecuting Attorney E. F. Bernard of Portland asserted that "the curfew law was the first assault on the constitutional rights

KEN NISHIMOTO IS FIRST WASHINGTON DC VOLUNTEER

The first nisei in Washington, DC, to volunteer for the special combat team, Ken Nishimoto, formerly of Stockton and Denver, recently received much publicity in newspapers of the nation's capital--"Japanese American volunteered 'because it is the least I can do for my country.'" The father of two children, Nishimoto formerly worked in the Denver WRA office.

PATIENTS MAY BE REMOVED

LOS ANGELES, May 16--Co-operative action on the part of the Army and Los Angeles county to get 175 tubercular Japanese now in La Crescenta and Monrovia sanitoriums, removed to points farther inland, appeared imminent.

The growing need for increased hospital accommodations in the Los Angeles area, and the acute shortage of such facilities are given as reasons for the proposed steps.

of American citizens of Japanese ancestry, but it was the initial one which led to the disgraceful situation where American citizens are staring through barbed-wire barricades on this land of freedom."

Justices Jackson and Black asked questions as to whether the court could set aside the decisions of military leaders as to what constitutes military necessity.

Asked Jackson:

"...Is it beyond the military leader's power to reach a judgment...and to exclude these people?"

Co-Attorney A. L. Wirin of Los Angeles replied "that exclusion would be warranted only under the most extreme circumstances, and those circumstances did not exist on the Pacific coast."

"The orders were carried out only against persons of Japanese descent," added Wirin.

PUEBLO JOURNAL

INMATES GET BETTER GRUB

Editorially stating that several thousand inmates (in a Montana concentration camp) are getting better grub and more of it than is being doled out to a majority of American families by the same government that is pampering the Japs in this and other camps, the Pueblo Journal, suggested that Congress refuse to make appropriations to continue such unpatriotic and inconsistent policies, in a recent edition.

Continued the editorial:

"We do not say that we should descend to the level of the barbarians in Japan in the treatment of Japs in America, whether they are American citizens or not."

"But we do say that this government has absolutely no right or no obligation, either legal or moral, to treat Japs in concentration camps in anywhere near the same way the government is treating its loyal and patriotic citizens who are sacrificing in so many ways to subdue the relatives of Japs in Japan."

REGULATION'S HOURS ISSUED BY HOSPITAL

The center hospital released the following immunization dates: Diphtheria shots will be given on June 2, from 9:30 to 10 a. m., and every three weeks thereafter on Wednesdays; Pertussis shots (whooping cough) will be given weekly on Wednesdays from 9:30 to 10 a. m.

Meanwhile, patients desiring eye examinations for glasses must see the medical doctor first during general clinic hours, and thereupon receive his date and time of appointment for the Optometry clinic from the out-patient receptionist. If the appointment date cannot be fulfilled, the patient should notify the Optometry clinic ahead of time.

All repairing and issuing of glasses has been moved to 6G-1F, the new location of the Optometry division.

WASHINGTON, May 13--Gov. Lester C. Hunt of Wyoming told the Senate Military Affairs committee that the Japanese Relocation center at Cody has given civilian authorities "no trouble and very little concern."

NEW CONFINEMENT CENTER CREATED

A new confinement center, at Leuppe, Ariz., has been created to house the American-born evacuees who are undependable, pro-Japanese or subversive, Myer disclosed. So far 55 nisei have been shifted to the camp from the 10 centers.

NEW PLAN TO SPEED UP RELOCATION PROGRAM

Willis J. Hanson, project leave officer, reports a new plan which will make it possible for more evacuees to leave the center on indefinite leave before receiving definite job offers.

Where a WRA relocation officer feels that he could place more people than are now coming into his area, he supplies the project leave officer with information about the number of workers needed, the types of jobs open, wages, housing, cost of living, and other facts about the community. The project director is then authorized to issue indefinite leave to evacuees whose skills fit the request made by the relocation officer. Upon arrival in the community, evacuees are helped by relocation supervisors and the local officer of the US Employment service to locate specific jobs.

Leave is issued only when there is every likelihood that the applicant will be employed quickly. Transportation and early living expenses are paid by WRA on the same basis as to persons leaving the center to accept specific jobs.

AUTO MECHANICS SHOULD REGISTER

Automobile mechanics with a minimum of two full years of such work experience are urged to register for possible outside employment in this field with Marvin W. Lawson at the US Employment service branch office, 6G information office.

Said Lawson, "Persons who have work experience in trades and occupations in which there is a shortage of workers should register so that we may serve you better when offers of employment for such skills arise."

6663 Thumbnail SKETCHES

The youngest principal in a Colorado high school in 1926 was Herbert K. Walther, Amache junior high principal, who was 19 years old. Even now, he is among the youngest school heads.

Walther embarked on a ministerial career by attending St. Johns college, Winfield, Kans., but later decided he would be more valuable as a teacher. Since then, he has established the enviable record of 15 years of teaching in Colorado. His teaching has not been confined to secondary schools as he has instructed at every college in this state.

He attained his college education by working his way from a grocery store clerk to a printer's "devil." Subsequently he received his BA in classical language and music at Denver U., and later acquired his MA in education at the same institution.

For the past 10 years he was the secretary of the Colorado Music Educators Association. He is now the president. Music-minded, he is recognized as one of the foremost music instructors in this state. As a youth, he played in dance bands.

Today, he is one of the ablest orators in this center. He has done an immeasurable amount of work in the resettlement program by acquainting outside people with the evacuees.

His immediate ambition is "to become a member of the commission for post-war education in Europe." Probably John Addington Symonds' verse, "The Days That Are To Be," best describes his philosophy:

These things shall be--
a loftier race
Than e'er the world hath
known shall rise
With flame of freedom in
the souls,
And light of knowledge
in their eyes.

SGT. OZAKI WISHES TO BE FIRST YANK ON JAPANESE SOIL

US FIGHTER BASE IN INDIA, May 17--The chief gripe here is the lack of chances to tangle with the Japanese, and Sgt. William K. Ozaki, 27-year-old Japanese American of Eaugallie, Fla., is perhaps the chief complainer of all.

He never has been in Japan, but is anxious to see the country of his ancestors as soon as possible --through the sights of his Tommy-gun.

"I'd be the happiest guy in the world if I could be the first American soldier to set foot on Japanese soil," Ozaki said. "I'll guarantee these Japs would know that I was there." Ozaki is in charge of four machine-gun squads.

Capt. Oswald Stewart, his commanding officer, has this to say about him: "He's a good sergeant, an excellent leader. Everybody likes him."

Ozaki joined the Army on May 21, 1942, and sailed for India, coincidentally, on Dec. 7, the first anniversary of Pearl Harbor.

ELEANOR ROOSEVELT IS CRITICIZED

EL CENTRO, Calif., May 13--Commending General De Witt for his stand in barring Japanese from the West coast and voicing disapproval of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt's "meddling in the problem of releasing the Japanese," the Patriotic organizations in Imperial county have taken the offensive against the return of Japanese to the Pacific coast.

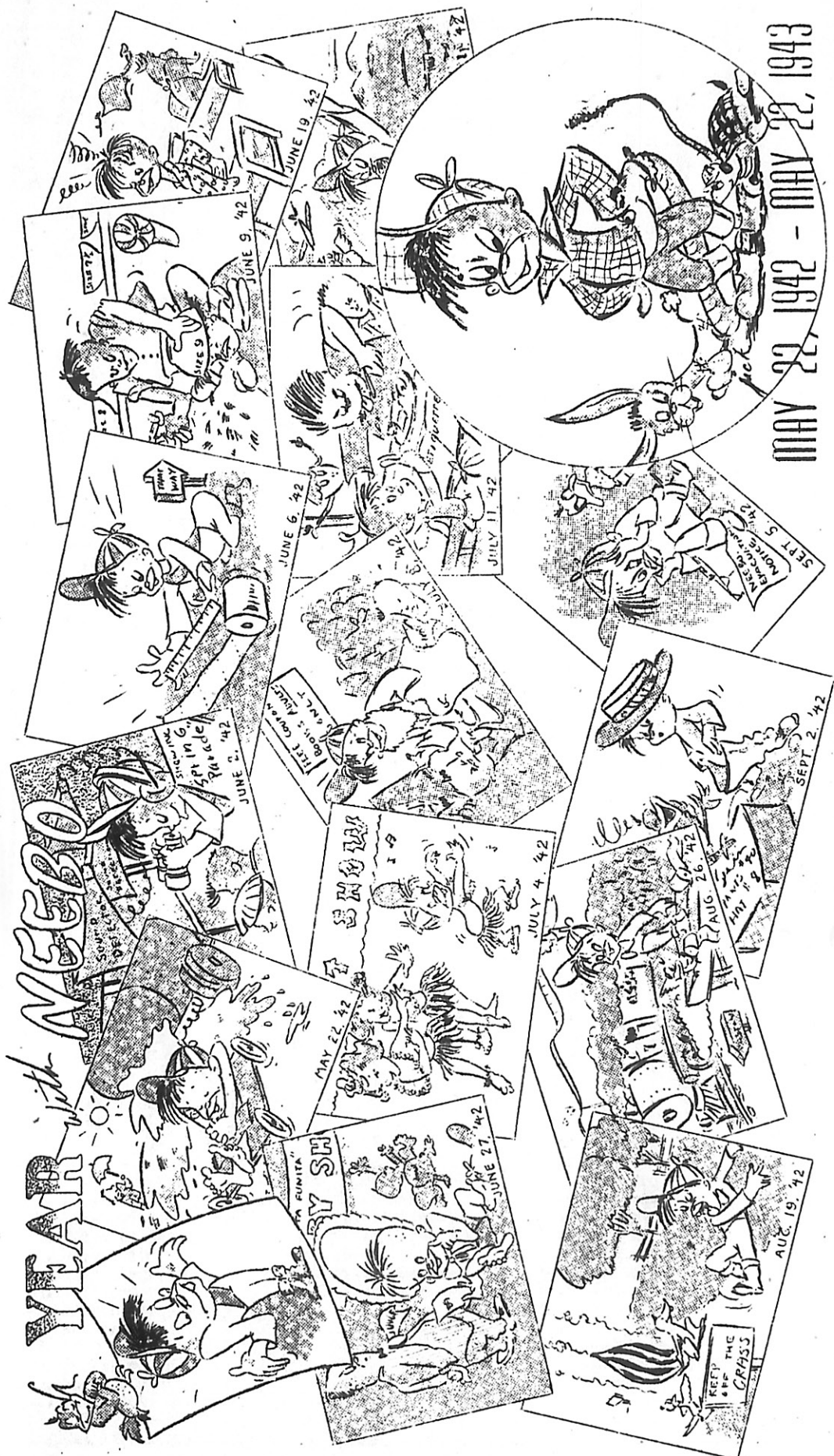
