# NAKANO TRIES TO END LIFE

An unsuccessful attempt at suicide was made Thursday by Yoshinosuke Nakano, 63, 12F-7C, who was found late that afternoon lying beneath the Arkansas river bridge with a slashed throat.

When found by Housing Superintendent Paul Freier and Plumber W. S. Keith, Nakano could only utter two words-"Manzanar" and "Granada," His clothes were soaked, indicating that he either fell or jumped into the river, according to the police.

He was taken to the center hospital and treated by Dr. Benjamin Higa, who disclosed that Nakano would live if he had not suffered too great loss of blood. He added that the knife used by Nakano had missed the jugular vein, but almost slashed the larynx.

Nakano was the 12F mess yard cleaner.

### We Must Produce

The Weshington office of the Wer Relocation author-ity warns each center that it must produce the maximum quantity of farm crops if present quantity and the quality of food-rationing are to be maintained.

A letter from Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, states that the money for food rations to be purchased in the domestic market has been reduced from 45 cents to 31 cents per day. The difference between these amounts --14 cents per day per person--must be produced on the farm, which means that the form must grow at least \$51.10 worth of food for each man, woman, and child in the center. However, because of the steady increase in the price of food, it would probably be necessary produce far more in order to maintain the kind of diet needed to protect the health of the people in this center. The steady increase in the cost of food is rapidly withering the purchasing power of our allotment; but even if the money were available, the center might have to go without the needed food were it not for the farm. Some foods, especially meats, connot be purchased regardless of the amount of money.

The slaughter of 600 head of cattle, 2,000 head of hogs, and 16,000 chickens, and the production of 2,455,000 eggs, as well as thousands of pounds of vegetables, will be required to furnish the needs.

The farm can be made to produce this food, providing the center turns out in full force immediately. Acres not planted within the next 10 days will not be planted. Right now planting is delayed by the lack of workers.

Further purchase of cattle will be withheld until corn can be planted, because it would be useless to have cattle and no feed. The prospective loss in to William Wells, chief, pounds of beef resulting from lack of feed may cause : serious shortage of nutritious foods necessary this winter.

# Negotiations for Internees.

WASHINGTON. May 22 -- An exchange of approximately 1,500 American civilians for an equal number of Japanese civilians may be arranged, announced the State depertment.

Negotiations for further exchanges of Americans held in Japanese-occupied territory and the Japanese in the United States had been under way since the first transfer took place last summer.

The State department is locating the Japanese in the United States whom the Tokyo government desires to repatriate, the announcement said. Until the task is completed, it cannot indicate the date when the exchange may be accomplished.

#### SC SURVEY FINDS MUCH MACHINERY

LOS ANGELES, May 25 --With the way now cleared by State legislation for condemnation and purchase of Japanese-owned farm machinery, Harry R. Oakley, local representative of the WRA, reported a recent Federal survey revealed approximately 1100 pieces of equipment in Southern California.

Among all of this idle machinery, there were only about 100 tractors, said Oakley. His explanation for the comparatively small number of tractors was that many Japanese apparently had sold their more valuable machinery before evacuation.

Fresno county has taken steps to soize all such machinery. Other counties were reported to be plan-. ning similar action.

# FRANKENSTEIN CONDEMNS RESOLUTIONS OF NSGW

An editorial by Alfred Frankenstein, condemning the resolution made by the Native Sons of the Golden West calling for an amendment to the Federal Constitution barring the first generation of American-born Japanese from citizenship, appeared in a recent issue of the SF Chronicle.

Wrote Frankenstein:

"This proposal would, of course, repeal the 14th and 15th Amendments. It would also repeal science, American history, and Christianity. There is no cnthropologist on earth ... who will pass a moral judgment on a race. There is not a Christian teacher ... who would agree that any race is inherently and unregenerately dishonest .... the whole American system of law and education is based upon the principle that the individual transcends all considerations of race and class.

"That such an amendment would, if passed, establish a precedent for the disqualification of any minority group against which any other minority group might choose to raise a clamor is obvious enough. That the amendment has no chance (of passing)...is also . obvious. Nevertheloss, it is disturbing to see it published as the considered opinion of a representative California

group.
"One hopes that the recent remarks of Governor Warren are more representative: 'Now as never before our faith in the democratic form of government must be sustained to the utmost in unity against enemies who would divide us along lines of race or

creed or origin. "

This experience proved invaluable, for she has been able to make closer contacts with the Japanese girls by skiing, sketing and hiking with them.
Miss Evans graduated

from Huron college, S.Dak., with a BA in history. She leter did some post-graduate work at the University . of Minnesota.

Her belief is, "one should know a little about everything and everything about something." Once she served as an interpreter man and receiving clork, between a Japanese doctor and his American patients during two major operations.


