MEAL CHARGES APPLY TO ALL WITH LEAVES

Evacuees who are on leaves of any type for purposes of accepting private employment shall be treated as visitors when they return to visit relatives or friends, announces Project Director James G. Lindley.

Visitors' permits will be issued and evacuees will be charged 35 cents a meal. This policy will not apply to individuals who have been granted indefinite leaves for attending schools and colleges, Lindley concluded. ELECTION RESULTS

SALE RECEIPTS

More than \$5000 are now being returned to members of the Consumer Enterprises. This amount represents a 5 per cent advence on patronage savings on \$100,000 of cash register receipts turned in through March 31. The balance of the profits will be voted on at the annual meeting in October.

From December 1, 1942, to March 31, 1943, customers threw away more than \$50,000 in cash register receipts. Profits tax will take 60 per cent of the profits on these unrecorded purchases. Beginning April l, patronage records are being kept by means scrip book sales. Savings of about 10 per cent or more on these sales will be given after the October meeting, according to E. H'. Runcorn, associate Enterprises superintendent.

Non-members are advised to use scrip since the first \$5 of patronage savings will be applied on a membership certificate. Then, on signing an application card, a non-member becomes a regular voting co-op member. the 6H election, and Jimmie Yamanaka and Joe Odama, 8K. Block 12K will hold its election Tuesday.

Others who feel that resettlement has too many problems are sitting back talking of the disadvantages of leaving the center to face readjustment and assimilation. But they are only looking at one side of the picture.

Masso Satow, former council chairman, who is now working for the YMCA in Salt Lake City dropped in the other day for a visit and our talk swung around to the necessity of getting out and away from the barbed-wire enclosures. People who have no intention or desire to resettle came up for dis-cussion and Satow raised a question that I am certain very few of them have considered. "You say they speak of the disadvantages and the problems they must face on the outside. Have they ever considered the disadvantages of staying in the center?" asked Satow.

It's worth thinking about.

Jitsumi Abe, supervisor of Unit 2 on the project farm, who produced the spinach which appear on the mess hall tables, presented Chinese chongi, and peas to Froject Director James G. Lindley, Wednesday. These vegetables are ready for harvesting and will be served in the mess halls very soon.







Hereafter the procedure of isolation and quarantine will be discontinued.

The public health nurse will make visits for cases which are now quarantined and give them releases. However, no new cases will be visited by the public health nurse unless especially requested by the doctor in attendance.

It is suggested that in cases where parents feel sure a child has German measles (which resembles measles and scarlet fever), the child be kept inside for seven days, or until disappearance of the rash. The child may then return to school or be permitted to associate with other children.
