May Secure Shoe Coupons

Applications for shoe ration coupon number two are now being received at Hanson Hall. Heretofore, coupons that were not used within 30 days received extensions, but hereafter, coupons will be good for only the stated time and no extensions will be made, according to Kay Funayama who is handling the applications.

The office will notify the applicant when the coupon arrives. Shoe ration coupons number two will be issued from June 16 to October 16.

DEDICATION PLANS MADE

"Better Americans Through Education" will be the theme of the dedication ceremonies of the new school auditorium scheduled for July 2 and 3.

Included in the program will be a pageant portraying the role of the nisei in the United States by the senior high students, a pantomime of youths in America by the junior high, and a pageant, "Young Americans Learn About America," by the elementary school.

MEAL CHARGES

APPLY TO ALL WITH LEAVES

Evacuees who are on leaves of any type for purposes of accepting private employment shall be treated as visitors when they return to visit relatives or friends, announces Project Director James G. Lindley.

Visitors' permits will be issued and evacuees will be charged 35 cents a meal. This policy will not apply to individuals who have been granted indefinite leaves for attending schools and colleges, Lindley concluded.

SEE SUPERVISOR BEFORE RETURN

Persons on indefinite leaves wishing to return to a relocation center should contact the relocation supervisor serving the area where they are residing, according to Leave Officer Willis Hanson. If no means of maintaining residence outside the center can be found, the supervisor will make arrangements for the evacuees' return.

Hanson stressed that no evacuee will be allowed to re-enter the center without the approval of the relocation supervisor. No evacuee is eligible for financial assistance the second time.

CO-OP RETURNS

\$5000 ON CASH

SALE RECEIPTS

More than \$5000 are now being returned to members of the Consumer Enterprises. This amount represents a 5 per cent advance on patronage savings on \$100,000 of cash register receipts turned in through March 31. The balance of the profits will be voted on at the annual meeting in October.

From December 1, 1942, to March 31, 1943, customers threw away more than \$50,000 in cash register receipts. Profits tax will take 60 per cent of the profits on these unrecorded purchases. Beginning April 1, patronage records are being kept by means of scrip book sales. Savings of about 10 per cent or more on these sales will be given after the October meeting, according to E. H. Runcorn, associate Enterprises superintendent.

Non-members are advised to use scrip since the first \$5 of patronage savings will be applied on a membership certificate. Then, on signing an application card, a non-member becomes a regular voting co-op member.

Others who feel that resettlement has too many problems are sitting back talking of the disadvantages of leaving the center to face readjustment and assimilation. But they are only looking at one side of the picture.

Maseo Satow, former council chairman, who is now working for the YMCA in Salt Lake City dropped in the other day for a visit and our talk swung around to the necessity of getting out and away from the barbed-wire enclosures. People who have no intention or desire to resettle came up for discussion and Satow raised a question that I am certain very few of them have considered. "You say they speak of the disadvantages and the problems they must face on the outside. Have they ever considered the disadvantages of staying in the center?" asked Satow.

It's worth thinking about.

A feature story of the first group of Japanese-American youths to go to Des Moines, Iowa, under the direction of the newly opened Des Moines WRA office, appeared in a recent issue of the Des Moines Register.

Said the story: "The first arrivals were unanimous in their observation that Iowans they meet are quite friendly to them. No where, they said, did they encounter any unfavorable reaction."

Vernon Kennedy, regional WRA supervisor, said that the group is representative of others to follow. "Many of them who have lived on the West Coast want to get into other parts of the country and make a new start," he said.

A photograph of the group with Vernon Kennedy appeared with the story. The group included Tom Komatsu, Roy Izumi, Bob Izumi, Tommy Zoriki, Kez Arai, Henry M. Sato, and Michael Yamane.

COMBAT TEAM, JAP RETURN OPPOSED

FRESNO, June 11--The San Joaquin valley council of the California State Chamber of Commerce endorsed the recommendation of its agricultural committee that Japanese evacuated from the state not be returned.

NAPA, Calif.--Napa Post 113 of the American Legion went on record opposing the return of the Japanese and advocated that Nipponese combat units in the Army be disbanded.

MARYSVILLE, Calif.--The district Chamber of Commerce protested the return of the Japanese and vigorously opposed the incorporation of American-born Japanese into the US Army.

VALLEJO, Calif.--Deportation of all persons of Japanese ancestry after the conclusion of the war was urged in a resolution adopted by the Vallejo City council.

AUBURN, Calif.--Lowell Sparks, secretary of the District Attorneys Association of California, made a public resolution adopted.

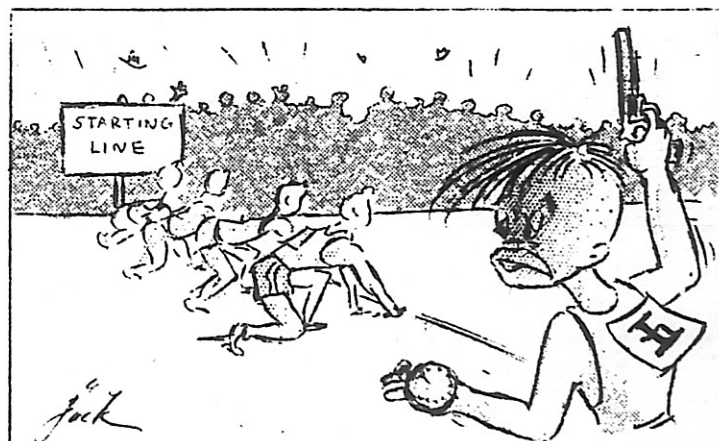
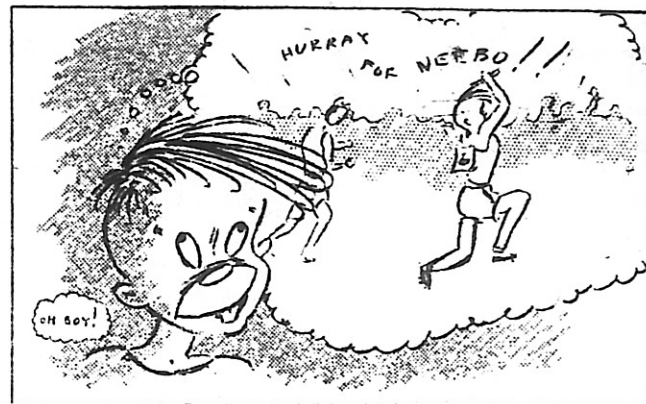
"Until the FBI and the intelligence branches of the Army and Navy hear the whirr of dragon wings," stated the editorial, "we think the Nation need not tremble."

MEASLES HIT CENTER

The situation in the center relative to German measles (Rubella) has reached an epidemic stage, and the public health department is unable to control the spread of the di-

sease through isolation and quarantine, according to Ruth E. Hudson, public health nurse.

Hereafter the procedure of isolation and quarantine will be discontinued.

The public health nurse will make visits for cases which are now quarantined and give them releases. However, no new cases will be visited by the public health nurse unless especially requested by the doctor in attendance.

It is suggested that in cases where parents feel sure a child has German measles (which resembles measles and scarlet fever), the child be kept inside for seven days, or until disappearance of the rash. The child may then return to school or be permitted to associate with other children.

Thumbnail SKETCHES

From 1924 to 1935 in the state of Oklahoma, there was an issei farmer who owned a hog farm next to the famous 101 ranch belonging to the Miller brothers. On this latter ranch was the training grounds for such famous movie stars of the past years as Buck Jones, Tom Mix, Harry Carey, Will Rogers, and Jackie Fox. This issei farmer used to visit the neighboring ranch and became a personal friend of these celebrities. Among his latest acquaintances is Cowboy Star Gene Autry in Oklahoma.

That hog farmer is none other than 63-year-old Ena Nakamura, supervisor of the project hog farm, who is contributing his experience and knowledge by taking care of 1,187 hogs with the help of his five assistants. Last September he started out with only 24 hogs on the center hog farm which was then a vast plain of weeds. What this farm is today, reflects Nakamura's ability and experience.

This issei, who looks like "bring-'em-back-alive Frank," farmed in Oklahoma for 13 years. Although he operated a celery farm near Stockton, Calif., until evacuation, Nakamura used to visit his 10-acre alfalfa farm in Oklahoma every year in February.

Nakamura is a rip-roaring cowpuncher who can ride and rope with the best. Back in 1923-24, he participated in cattle drives along the Nevada border.

Ever since he set foot on United States soil in 1919, Nakamura has worked from sunrise to sunset out on a farm or a ranch. He loves to read, but seldom has the leisure time.

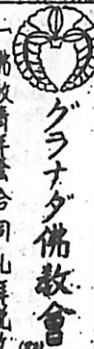
