CONSTITUTIONALITY OF EVACUATION IS UPHELD

WASHINGTON, June 21--Declaring that evacuation orders "were defense measures for the avowed purpose of safeguarding the military area in question," the supreme court held constitutional military regulations imposing a West coast curfew on all persons of Japanese ancestry and excluding them from specified areas.

BLOCKS 6H, 8K, 12K ELECT COUNCILMEN

In run-off elections held Saturday, S. Fukuhara was elected 6H block representative, and Jimmie Yamenaka, 8K representative. George Nekamura was named to represent 12K in yesterday's election.

SHORT-WAVE SETS TO BE TURNED IN

Short-wave radio sets were banned in all relocation centers to evacuees recently by the Washington WRA office and must be turned in to the police department by July 1.

No persons of Japanese descent residing in the Western Defense command may possess, use or operate a short-wave radio, according to a public proclamation of the Western Defense command.

Under a presidential proclamation, no enemy alien may have possession or use of such a set anywhere in the United States.

Heretofore citizen evacuees in relocation centers outside the Western Defense command were allowed to have them, but since it is impossible to keep aliens from access to a short-wave radio where alien and citizen alike live in one barrack, said Director Dillon S. Myer, short-wave was banned.

The short-wave attachments will be removed and the radio returned to the evacuee. Any set or attachment will be given back to the evacuee when he leaves the relocation center on seasonal or indefinite leave.

Asserted Chief Justice Stone, "in a case of threatened danger requiring prompt action it is a choice between inflicting obviously needless hardship on the many or sitting passive and unresisting in the presence of the threat."

The West coast curfew and evacuation orders had been challenged by two American-born persons of Japanese ancestry--Gordon Kiyoshi Hirabayashi of Seattle, and Minoru Yasui of Portland, Ore.--who contended they were US citizens and that such restrictions could not be constitutionally applied to them. It was in answer to their challenge that the supreme court delivered its decision.

It was pointed out that President Roosevelt had on Feb. 19, 1942, issued an executive order authorizing the secretary of war and military commanders to exclude "any and all persons" from military zones if that action should be deemed necessary.

The curfew restrictions, affecting all persons of Japanese ancestry on the West coast were imposed on March 24, and the exclusion orders came a few weeks later.

It may seem like a trivial matter to you, but it has really become a matter of concern to many of us. Therefore, we would appreciate it very much if you could in some way advise the people who are contemplating relocation of the fact that inasmuch as the behavior of the nisei is being watched very closely by the various communities, that they should be sensibly attired. There are some evacuees who seem to take delight in parading around downtown in T-shirts, jeans, zoot suits, etc., and are beginning to create a great deal of adverse comment by local residents. This does not mean that a person should be a fashion-plate, but they should realize that unlike the West Coast, the people out here are much more conservative and formal and that a fellow should at least wear a tie and coat in public.

COMMITTEE

Visits Poston

POSTON, Ariz., June 18-- Japanese school children at the Poston relocation center have little respect for the Dies sub-committee, members were told by a junior high school teacher, during the investigation of the camp made by the committee.

In addition to visiting the schools, the committee battled an afternoon dust-storm to inspect cellars and other likely spots where food might be cached. They found no stored food but expressed amazement at crowded conditions among the evacuees.

After visiting one home where eight persons slept in one room, Rep. Karl E. Mundt said:

"I am amazed at the close confinement some of these families are living under."

Chief complaint among the evacuees centered around the inability of many to obtain air conditioning equipment for their living quarters. One Japanese told the committee that the temperature did not drop below 103 degrees one night.

Most of the evacuees admitted they disliked the camp and did not wish to be here...."

NISEI SOLDIERS

RIGHTS ARE DEFENDED

That he was in accordance with the policy of the War department that "certain American soldiers of Japanese descent (be permitted) to attend to their affairs in California," was expressed by Chester Rowell, columnist of the SF Chronicle, recently.

Rowell stated: "...the department does insist that loyal American citizens of Japanese descent who have enlisted in the Army of the United States and are wearing its uniform shall be treated in the same way as American soldiers of German, Italian or Allied or Chinese descent.

"If there are civilians who raise the question of possible mob violence against such soldiers, the expectation is evidently that local and State au-

CIO BACKS EMPLOYMENT OF EVACUEE WORKERS

Condemning the recent activities of the Dies committee as "irresponsible, hindering the prosecution of the war..." the Washington Industrial Union council, representing all CIO unions in the District of Columbia, went on record last week in favor of the relocation program, according to a copy of the resolution received by WRA Director Dillon S. Myer:

The position taken by the union in its resolution was this:

The employment of evacuees outside relocation centers helps to utilize more fully the nation's manpower during the war against fascism and "sustains the democratic rights of residents of this land." The resolution also welcomed into membership evacuees who are working in the District of Columbia.

A report in the Gary, Indiana Post-Tribune, and the Lake county Industrial Union council of the CIO, is also backing the relocation program. The Post-Tribune quotes the secretary of the CIO council as saying:

"Since we allow patriotic German and Italian citizens to work, why should there be discrimination against the Japanese, simply because their skin is yellow."

DIES HEARING

VIEWS DIVIDED

LOS ANGELES, June 16-- A delegation of citizens from Phoenix, Ariz., warned the Dies sub-committee that bloodshed will follow continued release of Japanese from relocation centers to settle in Arizona.

At the same hearing, ministers from Los Angeles and vicinity pleaded for tolerance and release of the loyal Japanese.

The church group expressed the opinion that "there was no great resentment or opposition to the Japanese living in this country" but that "most of it has been whipped up by the press."

FILES SUBPOENAED BY COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, June 19-- Files of the JACL subpoenaed by the House committee on un-American activities were disclosed to contain a statement that a Japanese in this country publicly declared that President Roosevelt should be killed.

The report was made by a Japanese-American block leader at Manzanar relocation center. Said the manager:

"I related this incident but nothing was done. Therefore I feel that if at all possible, separate camps be set aside for undesirable Japanese nationals."

EVACUEES' RETURN TO COAST OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, June 15-- All 22 members of the California House delegation were on record as approving the proposed continuance of any persons of Nipponese ancestry returning to the Pacific Coast.

The statement will be submitted to President Roosevelt and to the Army.

thorities shall enforce order on their own citizens...."

He mentioned that the "testimony" on Japanese sabotage here in this country would not "even be admitted or heard by any judicial or quasi-judicial body in existence. If there are any real situations calling for investigation, it should be conducted by persons of more rational mental processes."

Rowell termed the proposal to amend the constitution to nullify the citizenship of all persons of Japanese race, the contention that native-born citizens of Japanese ancestry are not citizens, and the movement to deny them the right to live where they pleased after the war, as "hysterical nonsense...."

FOREIGN INVESTMENTS

MUST FILE REPORT

WASHINGTON, June 11--All persons subject to the jurisdiction of the United States with property in a foreign country having an aggregate value of more than \$10,000 on May 31, 1943, must file a report with their nearest Federal Reserve bank not later than August 31, the Treasury department announced.

The report applies not only to tangible property in foreign countries, but also to all intangible property issued or created by foreign countries or by persons within such countries.

In cases of bonds payable by their terms in United States dollars, interests in allied foreign organizations, and certain agreements and contracts, a report must be filed even though the aggregate value

FOOD SITUATION IS CLARIFIED

The following announcements in regard to baby food have been made by Ruth E. Hudson, public health nurse:

No baby food is to be issued to families who are relocating or are leaving the center for a visit, but a very small amount of S.M.A. will be allowed to babies under 10 months.

No baby food of any kind will be given to families who have moved to the Koen ranch. A cash allowance has been provided for these babies, and the parents are to obtain their own supply, said Nurse Hudson.

Families having babies are asked to contact the nurse in the public health office between the hours of 1 and 2 p.m. any afternoon for discussion of problems related to relocation.

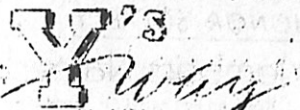
