### PARADE TO OPEN GALA THREE-DAY CELEBRATION

The three-day celebration to raise funds to support character building organizations and to promote the sales of War Bonds and Stamps will start with a parade at 6:30 p.m. Friday from Terry hall. Those in the line of march

are asked to assemble at 6 p.m.

Prizes will be awarded for the funniest, most original, and the worst entries, according to Ed Tokunaga, parade chairman. W. Ray Johnson, Henry Halliday, Donald Harbison, Jimmie Yamanaka, Joe Kayokata, Kenichi Shintani, and Khan Komei will be the judges.

The line of march will be from Terry hall, down 8th street, to G, then up to the high school auditorium, where the opening ceremony will follow. The Boy Scout Troop 179 Drum and Bugle corps will play the opening number. Led by Henry Suzukida, the audience will sing "The Star Spangled Banner." Scout Commissioner Ed Tokunaga will lead the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

## TOWN HALL TALK

William Wroth's warning that the continued use of water at the present rate would result in a serious shortage apparently fell on deaf ears. The volume of water being used has not been appreciably reduced.

The plants need the water, but so do the people. The rationing of water is something new to many of the evacuees who have always had an unlimited supply for both domestic and gardening use. Rationing of food was something new to the American people, but the adjustment was made. There is no reason the residents cannot make an adjustment in the use of water.

Water for the people must be clean and unadulterated; the plants can use dirty water with no ill effect. Water is being used daily for laundry purposes...the rinse water can be used for the irrigation of the gardens, the result being a saving of hundreds of gallons. There is no reason why all this water should be run down the drain in the face of a shortage later in the season.

All this will only be a temporary measure, for work on the irrigational facilities for the blocks is under way.

"I don't think there is a town in the United States that equals this record," proudly declared Chief of Police Tomlinson, referring to our June police record which shows but one arrest. And that was for a mild disturbance of peace. The visiting reporters were amazed at the lack of law infringement within the center.

The deadline for turning in short-wave radio sets was last Thursday, but Chief Tomlinson asks that anyone who may have forgotten to do so bring the sets in immediately. He said that once he starts a barracks-to-barracks check-up, anyone caught with a set will be prosecuted as provided in the ruling.—K.K.

The regular membership meeting of the co-op scheduled for the second Tuesday in July has been postponed until further notice, according to Secretary Akira Inaba.

More than 100 more farm workers are needed, stated Henry Inouye, general supervisor. At present, there are 170 regular workers with 25 to 100 volunteers daily.

According to Henry Shimizu, poultry supervisor, a total of 15,000 chickens are now being raised on the project farm. One thousand chickens are ready to be served on the mess hall tables, Shimizu said.

The center cannery, under the supervision of Roy Nakatani, is now being built at the Koen ranch and will soon be in use.

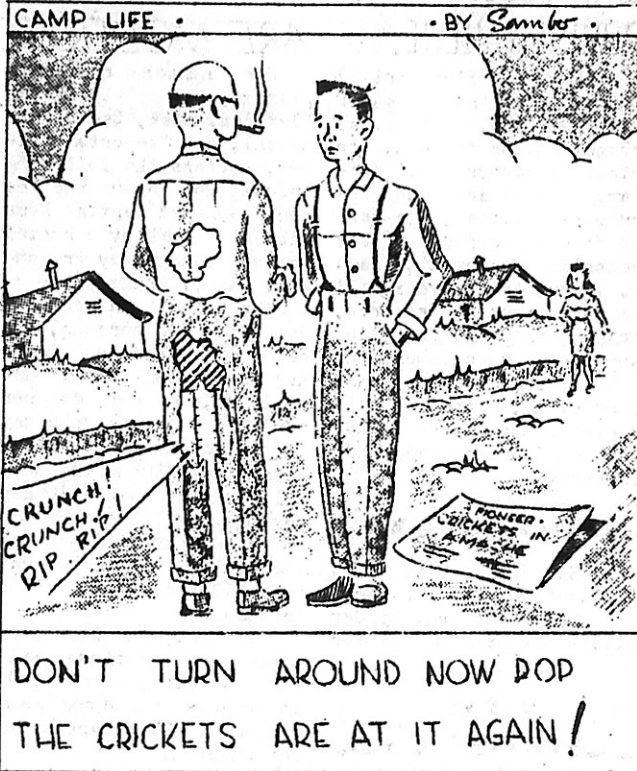

**SLOCUM DECLARES THAT HE WARNED FBI OF WAR**

Tokie Slocum, a Japanese American now employed by the War Manpower commission, told the Dies committee that he relayed to the FBI a warning he had received in November, 1941, that war was impending between Japan and the United States but was "laughed at."

He said that when Saburo Kurusu (Japanese admiral and special emissary to the United States) landed in Los Angeles, he was assigned by duly constituted authorities to "watch him."

He recalled meeting a friend who had been to a private party for Kurusu, who was drunk, and who said there was going to be a war. Slocum thought it might be Japanese propaganda but when the friend insisted that Kurusu was drunk, he (Slocum) reported the news to the FBI "but they laughed at me," he said.

The WMC employee said that he was the "No. 1 man that the pro-Japanese internees were after." He added that he had reported pro-Japanese violence a-

gainst pro-American internment, but that "WRA remedies are not compatible to the degree of crime."

# 0000 Thumbnail SKETCHES

Richard C. Suzuki of 11K -2E, better known to his associates and friends as "Tricky Dick," was called the fastest nisei trackman in Southern California when he covered the 100-yard dash in :09.9 at the JAAU meet in 1934. In fact, while he was attending the University of California, he used to make the great cinder star, Mushy Pollock, run at top speed in order to stay ahead of him.

His athletic career was confined not only to track, for he played football at Brawley JC, and later became a halfback on the University of California Ramblers' squad. It was at the latter institution that he received his BA in economics in 1936.

During his college days, Richard traveled extensively throughout California, visiting his friends' and classmates' home-towns. His hunger for travel was partially satisfied when, in 1940, he made a trip to the Far East, visiting China, Manchuria, and Japan. In 1939 at the San Francisco's World fair, he was employed as ground custodian for the Japanese Pavilion.

His birthplace was on the outskirts of Pearl Harbor, and he first set foot on the mainland when he was a youngster of twelve. He remembers his early childhood days when he learned to swim practically at the same time he was learning to walk.

Here at Amache, Richard is a general science instructor in the junior high school, and is known as a "trouble shooter," for he pinch-hits for any teacher who is absent.

He also has earned the distinction of being "the fellow who gets around." In fact, back in college he knew Harry Haka, another junior high instructor. This pair kept stumbling into one another often in the various California cities and towns, and again here. Finally, Harry remarked, "Destiny has made us relatives."

## HOSTEL RATES ARE MODERATE

For Amache residents planning to settle in the Cleveland area, Oscar Eutedahl, WRA reports officer, offers the following information about the recently-opened Baptist Home Mission Society hostel there, managed by Mr. and Mrs. Max L. Franzen.

The hostel can accommodate about 30 persons, and rates for staying there are as follows: While unemployed, \$1 per day per adult, 50 cents per day for children under 10. For those remaining at the hostel longer than a 10-day period after being employed, the rates are \$2 per day for adults, and \$1 per day for children. These prices include board and room.

kunaga, Scouts going on the trip should be above 14 years of age.

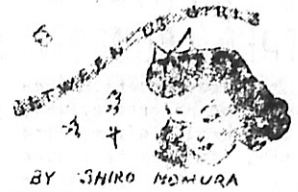

## 'PAY AS YOU GO' PLAN FOR TAXES IS NOW IN EFFECT

After July 1, most wage earners in the United States will pay Federal income taxes on a "pay as you go" basis in accordance with a recent Act of Congress.

On all money earned each week employers will deduct 20 per cent for taxes after allowances for personal and dependent exemptions

have been made.

The amount of wages not subject to deductions are: single persons (\$12 a week); married persons, where husband or wife claims the total allowance (\$24 a week). An additional exemption is made for each dependent of \$6 a week.

It is quite possible that the amount withheld from the individual's pay will not be exactly, to the penny, 20 per cent of the pay above his withholding exemption. This is because the law allows employers to withhold the tax in accordance with "wage bracket table." For example, in the case of married employees with three dependents, whose weekly wage is anywhere between 40 and 60 dollars, the employer is authorized to withhold a flat amount of \$2.60 per week, instead of requiring him to figure the exact amount for each individual employee.

Agricultural workers and persons employed in domestic service in a private home are not subject to the wage deductions but this does not excuse them from paying income taxes. They are required to file an income tax return as in the past.

Further information and advice on the new tax law is available to center residents through the Project Attorney's office.

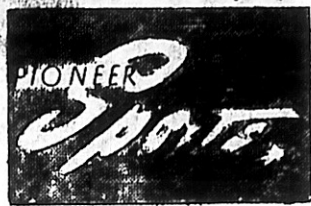
