The movement of segregees from Granada to Tule Lake is tentatively scheduled to take place on Sept. 15, according to a WRA instruction from Denver. A train due to leave Jerome on Sept. 13 will stop by Granada on the 15th to at:

Two movements of 500 each have been scheduled to arrive here from Tule Lake on the 21st and 29th of September.

The first movement of the segregation program according to present plans are to start on Sept. 10 from Tule Lake to Topaz. The train from Tule to the Central Utah center will arrive on the 12th and start the return trip on the 13th. This exchange continues through Sept. 30.

On Sept. 11 another trainload will leave Tule Lake for Heart Mountain. It will arrive there on the 15th and start back on the 14th, this exchange will continue through Oct. 1.

The final movement of the entire program will be a trainload from Tule Lake deliver - to Minidoka scheduled to arrive there on Oct. 21.

Tentative figures for the movement in and out from each center is as follows: Granada 1000 in, 150-200 out; Minidoka 2000 in, 950 out; Rohwer 0 in, 1000 out; Poston 0 in, 1,100 out; Heart Mountain 2000 in, 1,200 out.

Jerome 1,300 in, 1,900 out; Gila O in, 1,900 out; Manzanar O in, 2,300 out; and Topaz 2000 in, 1,700 out. Tule Lake will have roughly 8,300 people moving out and 12,400 coming

In a recent issue of the "Pacific Citizen" I saw where four doctors have already left Manzanar to start life ancw on the outside. As time goes on, the gradual exodus of our professional group is bound to . take place and every relocation center will have this problem to face.

From the very start of evacuation our medical and dental staffs have performed a Herculcan labor of love, working night and day in serving their follow men. Indoed, our doctors deserve a dozon medals for their unceasing solicitude and unselfish devotion to our welfare, all the time neglocting their own. If at any time there should be

some doctors who feel that Hord are a few lines they must relocate in order to rebuild their lives and fortunes anew, let us not be so selfish as to stand in their way.

On the other hand, we can show them that they are needed here more than ever and assure them that their personal sacrifices are deeply and sincerely approciated, perhaps we in Amache will not experience the misfortune of losing, someday, our Good Samari-

May I suggest that. our Amache Community Council extend to our professional mon and women a public vote of thanks in recognition and acknowledgment of their superlative service to the community.

BERRY S. SUZUKIDA (The problem of the possible "exodus" of our medical men has been a matter of grave concern to the Council. Recognition of and appreciation for unselfish public service has been repeatedly expressed. The Council on June 14 passed a resolution requesting the WRA, through our Project Director James G. Lindley, to "(1) Make an exception to the established pay rate for the WRA project workers in the case of the physicians and surgeons employed on the hospital staff, and (2) establish such pay rate and/or working conditions as to assure the center of an adequate modical staff remaining for the duration of the project." Following communication of the council's resolution to other centers, the community coun-cils of other projects have to confuse evacuoes who are supported our body's action with similar resolutions to Washington-Ed. note.)

TOWN MOLL TALK

The choice of Tule Lake as the segregation center although not unexpected by the residents has caused

chosen for this purpose.
The WRA in rovealing their choice gave the following four reasons for their decision.

Tule Lake is one of the larger centers and a large center is necessary to accommodate all the segregants.

Tule Lake has a large acreage of farm land and since there will be no leaves from there while the population in other centers will be on the decrease, it was deemed advisable to choose a center with large farming facilities.

Tule Lake lies within the Western Defense command and since evacuees are not allowed unescorted movement within this area it was felt that it was an ideal place to put the segregants who will not bo allowed to leave the conter anyway.

Tule Lake has the largest number of evacuees requiring segregation numbering nearly 5,000, and by choosing this center, the segregation movement will be facilitated to a certain extont. As it is, the government must move approximately 20,000 to and from Tule Lake before segregation is completed.

* Rumors persist that leaves will be frozen on Aug. 21 or on Sopt. 1 or some other date. These rumors are groundless.

Despite the segregation movement, relocation will continue to be the primary aim of this center and of the WRA, according to Project Director James Lindley.


