Kobe—Thirtieth Division Headquarters recently awarded Sgt. Yosh Teramoto, Barber, Calif., the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious achievement. The presentation was made by Maj. Gen. B. W. Clarkson. The 3rd division now occupies the Kobe-Osaka-Kyoto Area. Veterans of 25 months overseas. Teramoto landed first in Australia, then joined the 3rd. He is a member of the 12th Language Detail. A letter from Sgt. Walter Minal said the interpreters had an interesting but confusing time finding adequate English equivalents of the translation of cases. The Yamashita case is an unprecedented one, and we're expecting anything—a long drawn-out affair may be the outcome, the sergeant said in a letter written during the trial. Majority of the translators were making preparations to leave for Japan with the Allied Translator and Interpreters Section. Altogether, 18 nisei were selected of the War Crimes Investigation Section.

FEPC AUTHORITY EXTENDED TO NEXT JUNE 30TH

Washington—President Truman issued an order Thursday continuing until June 30, 1946, the authority of the fair employment practices committee to investigate and report on discrimination in employment occurring in private industry engaged in military or "effective" reconstruction production. FEPC officials said previous executive orders had continued its power in this respect only for the duration, and since the end of the war its jurisdiction has been questioned. The president's order Thursday, it was stated, removes this doubt. At the same time the president directed heads of government departments and agencies to analyze personnel policies to see that no racial discrimination is practiced in rehiring of temporary war job workers.

Urge Truman To Lift Relief Restrictions

Telegraphic message was dispatched yesterday from the Denver Presbyterian Council of Churches to President Truman, requesting that relief restrictions to Japan and to Germany be lifted. The message was sent to the Chief Executive following the executive session of the Council yesterday at the Y.W.C.A. it was disclosed by the Rev. C. P. Gorman, the Congregational Church. He explained that the Denver church organizations support the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation organization's program to aid the peoples of Europe. But, he said, UNRRA does not extend relief to the former Axis countries. Harold Gilmore is general secretary of the council of churches.

LINGUIST-SPEAKER WILL STUDY WEST COAST CONDITION FACING RETURNEES

Having recovered from influenza, Prof. H. P. Hoffman of Washington will speak in Japanese on the topic "Rescue Japan," at the Tabernacle auditorium Saturday at 7:30 p. m. It is Mr. Hoffman's purpose to take back to Washington the request that communications for relief purposes be opened with Japan. He also will report to his Seventh Day Adventist headquarters the condition of returnees on the West Coast. He leaves for the West Coast Sunday where he will travel up and down the coast to study the living condition of the Japanese-Americans.

Rail Firm Seeking More Workers At Tule

Tule Lake, Cal.—The Southern Pacific Company is one of many responsible companies bidding for the services of Tule Lake workers who are able to relocate. Many former workers for the railroad, including Tomozo Ishii, who has a record of 21 years of service, have been welcomed back to their former jobs, and new workers are leaving the Pacific Coast for Southern Pacific work jobs in a wide area of the West. Some readers who work on S.P. tracks have encountered sporadic hostilities from local communities. Southern Pacific recruiters are here for solicitations with Tuleans who seek jobs.

May Bring Home Remains of Nisei

Washington—The House passed a bill, during the week before Christmas holidays, to grant December 17, to bring home the bodies of the American dead who died when their families were in the hands of Japanese-American soldiers who were in action in the European Theater of operations, and buried in Italy. The bill, therefore, to request that the remains of their fallen sons be sent to them. In charge of the American war dead abroad is Lieut. Gen. Edmund P. Gregory, Quartermaster General. The Memorial Division of the Quartermaster General oversees the Graves Registration Service, the Personal Effects Bureau and National Cemeteries.

Tule Lake, Cal.—Death of Violet Sumire Fudeiani, 34 years old, an injury of her 11-month-old sister Kiyu in the home of their parents, Yushio and Shizuko Fudeiani, Tuesday, is being investigated by Charles Deeder, district attorney of Moffat county, and members of his staff. The children were struck on their heads apparently by a hammer when the younger child is expected to live, although she suffered a fracture of the skull. A few minutes after noon Wednesday, Mrs. Fudeiani ran screaming from her apartment to the apartment of a neighbor, who called Mr. Fudeiani from the mess hall where he was eating. Mrs. Fudeiani was placed in the hospital, where she has been since, unable to relate what occurred.
