Farmers Decide Not To Sell Them Land

Santa Barbara - Nearly 1200 farmers in the Santa Maria and Lompoc valleys have signed pledges which forbid sale or lease of lands in the northern part of the county to Japanese after the war, it was announced here today.

Action of the landowners was disclosed by Robert E. Easton, chairman of the California Citizens' Committee, in a Farm Center address.

Easton urged tolerance in the problem but asserted it would be better for all concerned if Japanese did not re-enter agriculture in this county.

Totaled 2500 Before Lt. Gen. John DeWitt's order excluded Japanese from the West it was estimated 2500 Japanese were engaged in agriculture in Santa Barbara County. Easton said they controlled about 12,000 acres of farm land.

"BLOC VOTING"

A not inconsiderable degree of misunderstanding appears to be cropping up among racial minority voting elements regarding the so-called "bloc" voting. Without minimizing the evils of deliberately maneuvered "bloc" voting practices, it may be said that some racists have looked their charge with portents of sheer evil intentions.

Actually, when voters of any social, economic or racial groups, constituting a legitimate group of eligible voters, honestly happen to desire the nomination, or election, of a political candidate, their persecutors have no legitimate grounds for attacking such a group attitude.

These groups need not feel ashamed about their conviction, nor need they take particular pains to hide their views on the subject.

League's Education Program Under Way

Chicago - The educational program of the JACL to bring about a better understanding of the Nisei whereby the public may accept them on an equal basis is entering a new phase. For the first time, a tour of the Atlantic seaboard, including the New England states, will be made by a nine-man team consisting of Dr. T. T. Yatabe, Midwest representative of the JACL, and Miss Ruby Yoshino, soprano.

The first appearance will be at Rochester, New York and then at Syracuse. The party will then start a tour of the New England states before appearing before groups around New York City and Philadelphia.

Suehiro received the Distinguished Service Cross early in the year for his performance as a one-man mortar section near Colli, Italy. Exposing himself to concentrated enemy fire, Suehiro loaded and fired a 40-mm mortar alone with such efficiency he single-handedly broke up a sizeable German infiltration attempt.

Denver, Colo. - Dates have been set for Mr. Thomas Higa to talk in Longmont on Sunday, October 22, and Keenesburg the following day.
