RULES GIVEN FOR PACKING PROPERTY FOR RELOCATION

The following regulations were issued this week by Center Manager Frank E. Davis in order to provide an orderly movement of personal effects to the Relocation area:

Each resident shall notify his house manager of all property now ready and available for packing. The house manager shall arrange to obtain from the supply supervisor any lumber, boxes or other material necessary for crating or packing.

The chief of the interior security police shall inspect the property at the time of packing or crating. Immediately after packing or crating, each container shall be tagged in accordance with instructions, with an identification tag to be provided by the supply supervisor. Each tag shall be stamped with an inspection stamp on which the inspector shall sign his name after inspection.

The supply supervisor shall arrange for proper storage until time of shipment. Containers once placed in storage will not again be available prior to departure.

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VISITING

By order of the Army, no visitors are being allowed in the Center today (Saturday), it was announced by the Administration.

However, this will be the only exception to the regular visiting rules now in effect (1-4 PM, Sunday and Tuesday through Friday). Friday, Sept. 11, is the last day for visitors.

Receptionist Himeko Katow requests that since visitors are increasing, all residents tell their prospective visitors to come early. Residents themselves should come promptly when they receive notices of visitors' arrival or wait in advance at the social hall on the appointed day. Many visitors have been turned away because they came too close to the 4 PM departure time, Miss Katow pointed out.

BASIC CLOTHING



The first shipments of basic clothing orders were received here last Friday and Monday, totalling 3000 pounds of merchandise, and subsequent shipments are expected to arrive regularly, it was revealed this week. The two shipments covered 475 orders.

Sears' representative disclosed that the first two shipments came from the firm's Kansas City and Los Angeles stores, and that all remaining orders will be sent from the Chicago branch.

Distribution is being made at clothing headquarters (Mess 19) as rapidly as possible. On Saturday, 83 complete and 116 incomplete orders were handed out to residents, while 85 complete and 75 incomplete orders were distributed on Monday.

There have been delays in the shipment of some early orders because the company did not have ordered items or adequate substitutes in stock. Such

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orders are awaiting completion before shipment to Tanforan is made.

George Hoshide, accountant for the Center's basic clothing service, stated that the WCCA, in its contract with Sears, Roebuck, had given the firm the right to make substitutions of color and style for any article. But in most cases, Hoshide pointed out, the substitutions have been to the benefit of the residents.

PERSONAL AID BUREAU

The Center Personal Aid bureau will officially close on September 14, it was announced this week by Yoshio Katayama, in charge. All residents desiring the bureau's assistance must apply before 5 PM of that day.

Due to the volume of work at this time, Katayama suggested that all matters which can be taken care of from the relocation center be postponed until arrival there. All files and papers of the bureau will be taken intact to the relocation Center by Katayama.

SCHOOL PARTIES

Marking the official closing of the high school, "Tanforan Hi Get-Away Day" will be held September 11, from 8:30 to 11 AM, in the southern end of the high school. The affair, sponsored by the faculty, is open to all registered high school students and invited guests.

The program, as tentatively planned, will be as follows:

- 3) Addresses by faculty and student representatives and Frank E. Kilpatrick, Jr.
- 4) Scholarship awards.

Report cards will be given out at the end of the program. George Aki is the general chairman of the affair.

In the afternoon of the same day, the school all-stars will play the faculty team in a softball exhibition game.

Tanforan's junior high school will hold a combined closing exercise, party and open house Wednesday, September 9, from 9 AM at the school. The program will include presentation of awards, student and faculty speeches, entertainment and refreshments.

Since the program will conclude all junior high school activities, parents of the students are especially invited to be present. All student work will be on display throughout the schoolroom for parental appraisal.

Don Wild, Center hospital superintendent, this week announced the following clinic closing dates:

Effective as of today, those requiring hospitalization will be transferred to the San Mateo Community hospital and will remain behind until formally discharged from there.

Those who must register to qualify for the November balloting are: persons who failed to vote in 1940, women who have married and changed their name since their previous registration, persons who changed their address while living in Alameda county, and persons who wish to change their party affiliation.

THREE NEW TITLISTS NAMED IN SECOND GLOVE TOURNEY

Matsuda had to shake the punches off during the first round, but he recovered sufficiently in the second and final rounds to pound out a decision over the hard-hitting Akamine.
