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NISEI ARE STILL TARGETS FOR TERROR IN CALIFORNIA

16 Shooting Incidents Marked Up Since January 2 by Charles A. Michie — N. Y. PM Daily

WASHINGTON. — The flash of terrorist guns, aimed at Americans of Japanese extraction, is accompanied to the action of a California jury which acquitted three persons accused of using tiles and dynamite to discourage the return of Nisei to their farm homes.

During the last week a jury of seven men and five women found three men not guilty of planting a dynamite bomb on the farm of Sumio Ooi, who returned a few months ago to his home location next to his farm in Placer County, Cal. Counsel defending the alleged dynamiters focused his plea for acquittal on the slogan "This is a white man's country. Let's keep it so."

PEAK TERRORISM

Law enforcement officials of California and WRA officials are fearful of a reign of terror against Nisei, forced to leave their farms and from relocation camps in the intermountain areas. The Army has ruled that it is permissible for Nisei who have been given a clean bill of health to return to their farms. In Oregon and Washington, terroristic activities are aimed at preparing them to return to their fertile farms whose acres are coveted by white inhabitants.

There isn't much that WRA officials can do about it. After all, they can't quarrel with the verdict of an American jury, no matter what the verdict is.

Meanwhile, it is reported by WRA that, since January 2, April 22, there have been 16 shooting incidents in California. Nobody was hit. It is clearly terroristic activity aimed at frightening Nisei who have the temerity to come home and try to earn a living from their farms again.

The WRA has a complete file of cases histories of the shooting. The most recent ones that have been made by law enforcement officials are those in the Dot case—and the man got off scot-free.

Violent Shot At

For instance, in Madera, Cal., near Fresno, Minoru Ohashi, an honorably discharged Army veteran, started to live in his home again. One night a black car whacked by his small house and five rifle bullets plunked into the walls. One missed his head by six inches. His brother-in-law, who has seen more than four years' service in the Army, was with him and narrowly escaped being hit.

Only 200 Nisei Settled in Chicago Return West

CHICAGO. — Fewer than 200 of 8,000 relocated Japanese Americans have left Chicago to return to their West Coast homes since the ban on living there was lifted last December.

H. Rex Lee of the WRA office in Washington said Chicago and most communities have accepted relocated Japanese Americans in a "democratic spirit."

"But," he added, "there have been isolated instances of discrimination" which he compares to the Nazi persecution of Jewish people.

Citing cases on the West Coast in which homes were damaged

and people of Japanese ancestry suffered employment, he said "race baiters who count success in dollars and cents" are the main leaders of action against Japanese Americans.

Killed In Action

Pvt. Joseph Hito Morishige, who was a member of the famed 442nd Regiment of the U. S. Fifth Army fighting on the Italian front, was reported killed in action on April 14, according to a telegraphic notification from the War Department received by his mother, Mrs. Chieko Morishige, of 1205 18th St., Denver.

Just 100 miles from where the San Francisco Security Conference is in progress, Chieko Kishii was shot while driving a civilian vehicle in Merced County, Cal. It was a week ago last Sunday. A car went past the house at a swift pace and four rifle shots plowed into the house. Kishii had two sons at Ft. Snelling, Minn., where men are trained for the Pacific intelligence service.

A week earlier, in Sacramento, Calif., he took a course in airplane mechanics and was employed by an aviation company in Sacramento, Cal., for some time prior to Pearl Harbor.

He was inducted into the Army in July 1944 while employed in Ohio and was trained in Camp Bleiberg, Italy. He went overseas in January of this year and joined the regiment in Southern France. The regiment was recently transferred to the Italian Front, reportedly in preparation of the final and all-out thrust against the German lines.

WASHINGTON. — Stressing that the war relocation centers will be closed by the end of the year, the WRA last week informed Rep. J. Will Robinson, D., Utah, they cannot reconsider their recent order which prohibits residents of relocation centers from leaving the camps for seasonal agricultural work.

The WRA's procedure that seasonal agriculture would be a deterrent to its plan of permanent resettlement of the evacuees outside the relocation centers.
