Wounded Nisei Soldier Gets Ovation In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, — Corporal Hoyal Iiyama, an American soldier of Japanese ancestry, known to the people of Los Angeles' castside, where thousands of Japanese Americans resided before evacuation, believe in the Bill of Rights.

Cpl. Iiyama, who returned recently from combat in Europe and is now convalescing at the Birmingham Hospital, was asked to speak at a United Nations rally, held in Hollenbeck Park.

He was introduced by Chairman Frank Wilkinson, who explained that Cpl. Iiyama had been in action with the famous 442nd Infantry Regiment of Japanese Americans. Wilkinson said the 442nd was the most highly decorated unit in the U. S. Army.

Nisei Committee Aids Resettlers And Organizes In Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, — The local Nisei Steering Committee, of the Committee, Mr. Sakai is the representative for relocation and housing to the American Friends Service Committee, and Mr. Miyasaka is the Committee's adviser to the Nisei High School Group.

Activities of the Nisei Steering Committee have included meeting newcomers at trains and helping them to get acquainted with Philadelphia; arranging for Issei and parties for Nisei at the hotel; holding dances and forums; and arranging speakers for meetings sponsored by schools and organizations.

On May 6 the Committee and the Young Friends Group sponsored a picnic on the grounds of the Friends Central School in the outskirts of Philadelphia which was attended by about 150 Issei, Nisei and Sansei and their friends. Miss Fuji Fujikawa of Heart Mountain was in charge of arrangements for the Nisei Committee. The program included games, singing, folk dancing, and hiking.

In April the Committee sponsored a forum on family relocation problems at which WRA representatives explained the services available to resettlers from WRA and cooperating agencies. The Committee recently distributed at the centers a special "Welcome to Philadelphia" edition of "Penn Notes," its newsletter, which included a section in Japanese prepared by a local Issei sub-committee.

The Committee raised some \$250 for the American Red Cross in Philadelphia, and members have also participated in war chest and bond drives.

Californians' Worry Grows At Treatment Of Evacuees

SAN FRANCISCO, — A feeling of concern among responsible Californians over treatment of returning Japanese American evacuees was growing this week as San Francisco played host to a meeting charged with writing a charter for a world organization in which no distinctions were to be recognized among races, colors and creeds.

By the end of April the number of Japanese American "incidents" — shootings, dynamiting, fires and posting of "No Japs Wanted" signs — in the three West Coast States had risen to fifteen. All of the nine occurring in April were concentrated in California, where newspapers received many letters from readers protesting against the acquittal of the other day of three persons at Auburn charged with arson and illegal use of explosives in terror raids against a returned evacuee family in January.

Plenty To Eat At Spring Retreat

CHICAGO, — Delegates to the Chicago-Land 2-day Spring Retreat, to be held May 20th and 27th at Des Plaines, will get plenty to eat.

This was assured when Uncle Sam agreed to cooperate by supplying enough Red Points to feed 125 hungry Nisei for the Saturday and Sunday meals.

The "big-little YEA" is being held under the auspices of the Nisei Fellowship group of the Chicago First Baptist Church, with the cooperation of the four other Christian church groups in this area.

Manzanar Light Levy Suit Asked

LOS ANGELES, — Suit against the Federal War Relocation Authority for collection of \$153,212 for electric service at Manzanar, was requested of the City Attorney by the Water and Power Commission this week. The amount covers service to the center since it was established early in 1942 up to the end of last month.

A compromise offer to pay \$100,000 was refused by the commission, which contended that the authority asked for and has been using the services under existing rates in the valley system.
