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The Washington Post: West Coast Terror

In California, since the beginning of this year, there have been 16 shooting incidents — directed at American citizens of Japanese ancestry. The Americans who were made targets of this terror had returned to their homes with the express permission of the United States Army. Their loyalty had been carefully scrutinized and certified by Army authorities. Some of them had been honorably discharged from the Army last Sunday.

Relatives from the camps of the War Relocation Authority after the Supreme Court of the United States had declared the detention of loyal citizens on grounds of race to be unconstitutional. These Americans are being persecuted because of their racial background — in the same way and for just the same reasons that prompted the Nazi persecution of racial minorities. When we gape at German atrocities, we might cast a backward glance at these atrocities of our own.

A California jury has acquitted James Ito, who was accused with his wife of a dynamite bomb on the farm of Sumio Sato, recently released from a relocation camp. Ito did not know the details of the evidence against

these men. But we do know that the presiding judge permitted the introduction of questions respecting the validity of the California Alien Land Act and that the defense attorney was allowed to tell the jury: "This is a white man's country. Let's keep it so."

We had supposed that "trials" of this character had ended with the collapse of Hitler's fortress.

These atrocities have been happening far from San Francisco, where the representatives of 48 nations — comprising people of every race and color — are striving to create a new organization to keep the peace.

They besmirch our principles and our pretensions. They are perpetrated to sustain by a few isolated hoodlums. Nevertheless, we are determined to smother Nazi stamp-trap tactics against loyal Japanese Americans and law-abiding Japanese aliens in spite of state laws and constitutional safeguards.

"With VE-Day achieved and the nation turned its full dollar, cases like this would not occur," said the judge speaking also to another radio shop owner, Harry Schwimmer. "If you were victims of a robbery you would have a hue and cry and law enforcement was breaking down."

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Japanese In Fresno Terrorized Again

FRESNO, Calif. — A second incident involving returned Japanese occurred here Wednesday night when a rock was thrown through the window of a house formerly occupied by Japanese.

Inside the house were several Japanese, recently returned from relocation centers, in addition to the Caucasian caretakers who have been occupying it since the original order evacuating Japanese from the area.

Prior to the incident, so far as police know, only the caretakers were living in the place. One of the caretakers, Mrs. E. Dishi, reportedly threw a rock, throwing and told police at the same time that the Japanese were also in occupancy.
