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Ickes Condemns Judge In Nisei Case

WASHINGTON, — Secretary of Interior Ickes said that Justice of the Peace L. B. Crosby of Parlier, Cal., was a disgrace to the law because of his conduct of a case involving a terror attack against a Japanese American family.

"If California has any law under which it can reach out and denote that justice of the peace they ought to be let any time," Ickes said.

Crosby, six months ago, imposed sentence to Levi Multani, 33, who was charged with using a gun "in a rude and threatening manner" after four shots were fired into the home of Charles Iwasaki at Parlier. Crosby said it was dammed ride," Ickes said.

"Crosby parts of California instead of having law and order as their ideal have law and disorder," Ickes said. "It's terrible.

Judge Stands Pat On Decision

PARLIER, — Justice of the Peace L. B. Crosby said Thursday, "I take full responsibility" for leniency to a young farmer who shot into the home of a Japanese American family "but in a measure it was a community arrangement to prevent further violence."

There was a crowd of Parlier farmers and townspeople in the courtroom before the trial started, and we talked the situation over, all of us," he said.

"It was the arrangement that there would be no severe punishment and that the shooting was a stopgap and that was the important thing."

Crosby said before he asked Iwasaki if he had any objection and was told the complaining witness had none.

He said two army intelligence officers also were asked if they had any objection and offered none.

Crosby declared:

"I am sure I can guarantee there will be no more cases of this kind in the Parlier community, if they will simply leave us to handle this matter."

CIO Condemns Jury In Placer Raid Trial

LOS ANGELES, — The Congress of Industrial Organizations District Aircraft and Aircraft Council last Saturday condemned attacks on Japanese Americans and urged the governors of California, Oregon and Washington to take similar steps to prevent further terrorism.

The union said action of a Placer County, Calif., jury in acquitting three persons accused of terrorizing Japanese Americans was "a legal dodge" and reported the only issue in the intra union dispute is race discrimination.

The Shasta-Trinity Fomenta Grange, which favors a constitutional amendment to prevent persons of Japanese ancestry from becoming citizens.

The Grange was suspended when members refused to work with persons of Japanese descent and the members were then required to sign cards stating they would uphold the union no discrimination policy. Those failing to do so face trial by a federal grand jury.

A group of Stockton warehousemen have been circulating repudiations of the executive board action, claiming the issue now is one of union democracy.

Richard Lynden, local president, stated:

"There is only one issue at stake. That issue is whether the members of our union will or will not work on the job with other workers regardless of race, creed, color or national origin, as the union's constitution provides."
