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UNION LIMITS NISEI TO EX-SERVICE MEN

Teamsters' Union Says It Will Oppose All Other Japanese in West Coast Jobs

BEATLE, — American-born Japanese who have served their country by service in the armed forces of the United States will be welcome to work alongside members of the Teamsters Union, Dave Beck, vice president of the International for eleven western states, said last night.

However, Beck declared, the Teamsters Union "unashamedly opposed to the effort that now is being made to rush the Japanese back into the strategic places they once held on the Pacific Coast."

He added:

"In so far as the American-born Japanese are concerned, if they have served in the Army or Navy of the United States during this war and have been honorably discharged, we accept them without question and will work beside them."

"With respect to all other Japanese, however, we say 'Nisei or not, we do not care about like that of our Government, itself, which has placed a big question mark after their name by refusing to permit their employment in ports of embarkation, in airplane plants, and ammunition factories and other places where the safety and security of our war effort are involved, without special investigating and processing by Army and Navy intelligence offices."

'Policy One of Suspicion'
"Certainly we owe no obligation whatever to foreignborn Japanese. We cannot return their return to this Coast under any circumstances. Our Government's policy toward even the non-service Nisei is one of suspicion. This policy is based on the fact that many of those who were here during the war, when these people were in relocation centers, Many Nisei are known to prefer the Japanese system of government to our own. We cannot therefore, refuse to accept them, but after this war, in the Pacific has been won and so long thereafter as our Government adheres to its present policy."

Mr. Beck continued:

"The Japanese have not joined, nor will they join, with any other organization on this matter of policy. Just as we oppose the return of the Japanese during this war, so do we also oppose the activities of groups which seek to commercialize anti-Japanese feeling for financial purposes."

Rest on Government Opinion

"We feel that until our Government accepts the Japanese on the same basis as the people of other nationalities, and until it is willing to place its complete trust in the loyalty of all Nisei and admit them to all phases of secret and confidential war work, our position will not change. Our Government now questions their loyalty—and so do we."

"We feel it is a mistake to attempt to force the people of the West Coast to accept the returning Japanese, no matter when they were born, while our sons and brothers are still the victims of Japanese barbarity."

Solon Champions Minority Workers

WASHINGTON, — Declaring that "we are now entering a more critical phase," Senator Myers, Democrat of Pennsylvania, advocated this week that funds for the Fair Employment Practice Commission be continued.

President Truman recommended \$500,000 to repair the commission next year.

He said the full cost of the War Agencies Appropriation bill on the ground that legislation to create a permanent FEPC was before Congress and that Richard Lyndon, president of ILWU Local 6, acted as witness, complainant and prosecutor.

Closed Trial Held in Stockton Union Dispute

STOCKTON, Calif.—An International Teamsters' Union trial committee Sunday tried five of the union's Stockton unit members on charges of discriminating against a Japanese worker, but announced no decision.

Joseph Lynch, acting administrator of the Stockton unit, said the outcome will be made public in "about two weeks."

The press and public were barred from the trial session. Admission was by union book only. Lynch gave this account of the proceedings:

45 Cases Are Held Over

Albert Schmitz, John O. Schmidt, James McHugh, C. V. Sheehy were tried. Approximately 45 other members who failed to sign no discrimination pledge cards were not tried and their cases were held over.

Sheehy refused to testify. He claimed he was being tried on the ground the trial committee was not formed according to the union constitution, that he was not in Stockton on the dates specified in the charges and that Richard Lyndon, president of ILWU Local 6, acted as witness, complainant and prosecutor.

Announce Engagement

Miss Michiko Sato, younger sister of Carl Sato of Mesa, Arizona, announced her engagement to Mr. Tatsuno Ikeda, popular Bussei leader of the Mesa YBA, on June 15 at her home in Honolulu. Kow officiated over the engagement ceremony.

The bishashimis were Mr. and Mrs. Ishikawa and Mr. and Mrs. Horiba.

Only 470 Japanese of Washington's original 14,000 Japanese have returned, according to information released by W. L. Vinson, Oregon WRA relocation director.

Hundreds of Japanese who had been sent to the interior in 1942 have returned to California. There were an estimated 4,000 Japanese in Oregon before they were evacuated in 1942.

Four Testify

The other four members on trial supported Sheehy in his objections to Lyndon, but did not refuse to testify.

Smith told the committee: "I abide by all the rules and regulations of the constitution of Local 6, but I hope you don't send me to jail with us."

The trial committee was made up of members of Local 6 units in San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose, and Stockton. It will meet again "within a few days and, Lynch said, review "a couple hundred pages of evidence."

Will Make Recommendation

The committee will make a recommendation which will go to the union's general executive board for a decision and then to the units at San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose, Stockton, Petaluma and Crockett for concurrence.

In the meantime, Lynch said, units other than Stockton have voted to uphold the "no discrimination" policy.

He added:

"I know offhand Japanese are working in San Francisco, Oakland and San Jose. There is no way to tell how many because records of the union do not show 'ace, creed, or color of members.'

33 Attacks Made On Resettlers

LOS ANGELES, — Dillon S. Myer, WRA national director, revealed Wednesday that 33 attacks against resettled Japanese have occurred since the end of January—in the last 2 weeks.

Twenty of the attacks were shootings, one a dynamiting, and three were arson cases. In nine instances, he said, Japanese were threatened and warned to stay away from certain areas.

At an estimate some 600 Japanese were held off by racial bias in the first four or five years of the Japanese in America's eligible for resettlement, now in the nation's eight relocation centers, would return to the West Coast in a final movement now getting under way.

Approximately 49,000 of the evacuees already have established homes in various parts of the country, he disclosed, with 4,000 on the West Coast, 10,000 in Chicago and the others in widely separated areas.

"I believe, however, that not less than 50,000 will return to the United States during the next four or five years," he said.

Myer said resettled Japanese have not entered agriculture in areas outside the West Coast, but have for the most part taken "any jobs they can get."

He said many of the 2,500 employees of WRA "are probably entitled to government agencies" as need of their services in connection with Japanese relocation comes to an end.

C. of C. in Yuba County Opposes Harvest Use of Japanese

MARYSVILLE (Yuba Co.), Calif.—The Marysville District Chamber of Commerce is on record as opposing the return of Japanese Americans to this area to aid in the 1945 fruit harvest.

The following letter was sent by the committee to Congressman Clarence F. Lee, Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ikes and United States Senators Sheridan Downey and Hiriam W. Johnson:

Wanted By Minority

It has come to our attention that there is a decided move among certain elements within our community to discriminate against employing Japanese. These elements are, however, very definitely in the minority.

Through a recent occurrence in the City of Wheatland, Yuba County, we have experienced the hazards that go with the replacement of Japanese Americans and Japanese Americans in this area at this time.

(The Wheatland incident referred to was based on a complaint by Harvey B. Whitten, operator of a ranch employing Japanese Americans that he was threatened with discharge by two men in service uniforms. The incident was on May 1st.)

Fear Labor Complications

It is the feeling of responsible farmers, and definitely the feeling of agricultural allied industrial operators that to employ Japanese in this area in agriculture will bring about serious labor complications in our canneries and processing plants, the results of which would be a disastrous stoppage of the processing of foodstuff's 65 to 70 percent contracted at the present time direct to the United States Army direct.

This community definitely

feels that the reemployment of soldiers returning from, and leaving for, the Pacific will incur many unpleasant contacts, to say the least, between Japanese Americans and the community at this time. This community's first consideration is with the welfare of our army and it is our desire to cooperate with them in the difficult task of preserving maximum efficiency of foodstuff's for army consumption. It is further our desire to cooperate with the army, and particularly with Camp Beale, with its problem of ever shifting troops to and from the Pacific theater of war.

Commander A. E. Hindmarsh, Washington D. C. Director of Naval Oriental Language Study said the first month would be devoted to orientation giving the trained vocabulary of a six-year-old Nipponese. After that the American-born Japanese teacher will speak no language but Japanese to be used.

The men will keep in touch with the Pacific war by reading Japanese newspapers. The Navy's own miniature radiotelegraph station will flood their radios station news with Japanese news. When the men gather in the lounge or dining hall, the conversation will be all Nipponese.

School in Japanese Makes Little Tokyo Of Western Campus

STILLWATER, Okla.—The University of Okla. College campus became a "little Tokyo" for students in the Navy's new oriental language school June 18 as they began a 14-month course during which, with minor exceptions, they will speak, write and hear only Japanese.

The school is the second to be opened by the Navy. The other, at the University of Colorado, Boulder, already has sent interpreters and translators into the Pacific theaters.
