Evacuee Parents of Deceased Soldiers Should File Reclaims

WASHINGTON. — Evacuees' parents of deceased servicemen whose claims for death pensions have previously been rejected by the War Claims Administration, which who are now planning relocation should not appeal their claims but should file reclaims on the basis of a change of circumstances, according to advice received from the Washington Welfare Service.

Closing of centers and death pension applicants' resettlement in outside communities may be considered a change of circumstances. In a letter to a WRA General Office in Brayton, Veterans Administration claimed that death pension claims which have been denied center residents up to this time were rejected because evacuees maintained that government expense on relocation projects was being expended, dependents without the meaning of the pension law.

Applications for filing death pension claims or reclaims may be obtained by addressing a request to the Manager, Veterans Administration, or the nearest office of that agency. Offices near relocation centers are: Little Rock, Ark.; Tucson, Ariz.; Boise, Idaho; Cheyenne, Wyo.; Los Angeles; San Francisco; Denver; and Salt Lake City.

WRA SEES ONLY HALF OF NISEI BACK ON COAST

WASHINGTON. — The WRA estimates only half of the 110,000 Japanese Americans evacuated from the West Coast will return.

During the first six months of this year, agency Director Dillon Myer informed the house appropriations committee, about one third of the evacuees released from relocation centers went back to the West Coast.

This action was taken, despite widespread belief that Wednesday night disturbances at the establishment, where some 150 Japanese Americans are temporarily quartered, were caused by young hoodlums and drunks.

Replying to a question by Committeeman Endlow, Myer reported Japanese Americans who have settled away from the Pacific Coast "have been well accepted by the people they are working with, the community, and by the church groups."

Myer said his agency is moving

evacuees out of the centers at a rate of 3,000 a week and that the job of resettling the Japanese Americans should be completed by the end of January.

The committee commented in its report that the liquidation of the agency should proceed more rapidly, and especially those pro-Japanese slated to be returned to Japan should be "segregated and returned with all possible dispatch."

Myer disclosed about 4,500 of the 6,700 pro-Japan individuals being detained in this country are at the Tule Lake Segregation Center.

Anti-Nisei Terrorism S.F. Police Set All-Night Guard at Hostel Quarters

SAN FRANCISCO. — An all-night police guard will be maintained at the San Francisco Buddhist Hostel, 1881 Pine Street, to protect Japanese Americans from possible outbreaks of anti-Nisei terrorism, Chief of Police Duella announced last week.

This action was taken, despite widespread belief that Wednesday night disturbances at the establishment, where some 150 Japanese Americans are temporarily quartered, were caused by young hoodlums and drunks.
