## "Joseph Smart Will Direct Jap Centers in Mountain States"

Washington (AP) - "WRA appointed Joseph H. Smart as regional director, with headquarters in Denver ... Two relocation centers thus far have been designated which will come under his supervision." # "Japanese Decries Mass Evacuation"

New York--At a meeting of the Post War World Council called to discuss the question of Japanese evacuation, Mike M. Masoka, national secretary of the Japanese-American Citizens, said: "We are a test of domocracy," referring to evacuation on the West Coast, "if they do that to one group, they can do that to other groups." A resolution that recommended "that both military and civil authorities keep the evacuation within present goographical bounds, and that after evacuation the entire matter of assembly and resottlement be taken from military authority and put into civilian control through Federal bureaus... " N.Y. Thirdly that "American citizens of Japanese ancestry be exempted from all orders and that boards of hearing be established so that both alien and citizen may appear and have their cases heard. It ended with the recommendation that every effort be made to see that these temporary shelters... shall not through any cause be permitted to become even semi-permanent. " Resolution adopted by close voice vote.

Miss Teru Masumoto, who represented the Japanese-American Committee for Democracy, offered a resolution in opposition which was narrowly defeated. C. Read Cary of the American Friends Committee

described conditions at resettlement camps as differing only slightly from concentration camps abroad. Roger Baldwin, director of the American Civil Liberties Union, discussed legal effects of the evacuation. He said: "that the excuse of military necessity should not be tolerated..."--New York Times, June 19, p. 6. #694
