"American Japs Good Soldiers"

Honolulu (AP) -- "Army headquarters announced that American soldiers of Japanese ancestry who have been mustered into the army in the last two years have been sent to the mainland and are in training at Camp McCoy, Sparta, Wis., preparing for action on one of T.H. the many battlefronts. Army authorities said these troops would be assigned to combat duty elsewhere because it was believed they could serve their country best in that way. The officers said the physical similarity between these troops and men of the Japanese army would constitute a military hazard in case of contact in the Pacific area. It was said that these Japanese-Americans had established an enviable record for efficiency and devotion to duty and that their conduct before, during and since the attack on Pearl Harbor had been exemplary.
