## "Our Japs Have Gone to Work"

Under the above title John Bird, former head of the WRA information division, wrote a 5,000-word article telling the story of the Japanese evacuation from the perspective of agriculture. "It is certain that with the Japs gone, the complexion and total farm output of the Pacific Coast region is in for a change ... California in particular ... Altogether, in 1940 Japanese farm operators on the West Coast controlled about 6,000 farms, totaling 258,000 acres... In some crops they have specialized almost to the point of monopoly ... Eighty per cent of California's boans, celery, peas, cucumbers, peppers; 75 per cent of the garlic; 60 per cent of the market tomatoes, spinach and cauliflower." Describes relocation projects, sidelights on life, agricultural plans and public works projects to be developed. Discusses question of loyalty. "It is cortain that the evacuees as a group are co-operating wholeheartedly with the government in the relocation program. ## Farming Unit Under Control of War Department for the Duration

Denver--Center to be located a few miles north of Delta. It will receive 10,000 Japanese upon its completion in August. Almost half of the 20,000-acre tract privately owned, most of the balance owned by Millard county. The area produces alfalfa, sugar beets and grain. "The fact that a complete system of irrigation ditches is already laid out under the Abraham and Descret Water Company, with a railroad branch

## "WRA Officials Minimize Evacuee Center Dangers"

Delta-- "Reporting that residents of Delta ! have nothing to fear! from the proximity of the Japanese war relocation camp at Abraham, four WRA officials from San Francisco left here Thursday after making a week-end inspection of the camp. Japanese in other camps have cooperated wholeheartedly with the WRA in making the camps successful. and have caused no trouble, according to Edwin Bates, chief of in-Jtah formation division for the region and a member of the inspection group ... " Mr. Bates outlined in detail how the camp would operate. "Mr. Bates explained that private employment of evacuees on forms is a matter which will have to be worked out. He added that about 1200 workers from relocation centers and temporary assembly centers had gone from California to work in Idaho, Oregon and Montana beet fields this year.
