

Tulelake -- Fourteen-inch editorial protested against an article written by Lou Eichler for the Appeal Democrat of Marysville and Yuba City. The inference of the article, of which a part was quoted, was that the Tule-lake country "was a dreary waste until the Japanese population was Calif. shunted in to the WRA settlement here this spring" and that the Japanose would undoubtedly turn it into a "garden spot." Editorial outlined all the work that had been done on the lands before the Japanese arrived. "... However, the theory that the achievements of the Japanese on our land will prove that we have been unapprociative of our privileges, we resent. One recent visitor here has already been quoted as saying that the whole theory that the Japanese are superior at certain types of farming has been broken down by the experience of the present year when people of Japanese descent are in WRA settlements such as that at Tule Lake, and whites are doing a wartime job on land they formerly worked.
