Fobinson expressed "grave concern over the lack Utah of restrictions on the movements of Japanese aliens and citizens of Japanese descent in Utah military zones. American-born Japanese, as distinguished from enemy aliens, may be permitted to remove to unrestricted parts of the country after winding up their business affairs in this sector. San Francisco--"German and Italian aliens eligible for exemptions from wartime travel and curfew restrictions must obtain permits through their local Civilian Defense Council beginning Friday..." Bendetsen emphasized there had been no relaxing of the travel and curfew restrictions and that all provisions of the order issued in March by Gen.
