"All Japanese to be Moved"

Portland--"All Japanese aliens and Japanese-Americans will have been evacuated from the Portland assembly center by September 10, but the center will continue to be used by the army for the duration of the war, Col. "Axis Aliens Not to be Denied Relief"

Calif. San Francisco--"The Western Defense Command today announced German and Italian aliens whose temporary exemption from travel and curfew rules was canceled recently may not be barred from emergency relief in appropriate cases. "The U.S. is Upheld in the First Test Case on Enemy Alien Directive"

Calif. San Francisco--"A petition by the American Civil Liberties Union seeking freedom for Fred Koremotsu, 23 year old Japanese arrested in Centerville a month ago for illegally being in Military Area No. 1, was denied yesterday in Sacramento by Federal Judge Martin I. Walsh, A. J. Zirpoli, assistant U.S. Attorney here, reported.
