### "Evacuees Given Private Job O.K."

"The uncertainty that has surrounded the question of private families securing evacuee domestic help was cleared up here today by Joseph G. Beeson, associate employment investigator for the war relocation authority. Beeson said an evacuee may be granted indefinite leave from a relocation Idaho center to engage in any legitimate type of private employment outside prohibited military areas, including domestic work, after investigation of both the evocuee and the employment offer. Announcement of this regulation was made recently by Davis McEntire, chief of the WRA employment division, San Francisco, Beeson said.... "-- Twin Falls Times-News, October 30, p. 5.
