The new batch brought to 2,124 the number of aliens seized here since the attack on Pearl Harbor. Of this number 1,353 are Germans, 392 Italians, 371 Japanese, five Hungarians and three Rumanians.... The two Japanese were members of the Hokuka Dan, Japanese nationalistic society, which raised funds here for the Japanese Army and Navy."--New York Times, November 1, sec. 1, p. 25.

Sacramento (AP)--"State Director of Agriculture W. J. Cecil today asked the Federal Government to help alleviate southern California's critical milk supply problem by changing its milk deliveries to a Japanese internment camp in the Colorado River area.... He pointed out that residents of Riverside County and other southern California areas are unable to get ample milk because of the drain of milk to the Los Angeles area and its later diversion to the Jap camp.... Canned milk could well be substituted for fresh milk in many cases, Cecil said..."--San Francisco Examiner, November 11, p. 28.
