My Dear Fakes.

The weather here has not warmed up yet. Beans are just coming up now. Almost every had to fill in hills that did not grow. I bought a couple of pounds of seed from the Company and have this much left to which you are welcome.

There is no pea twine for sale in the Puget Sound area. There will be a shortage of about 10 tons here this year. I am sending you five pound out of what I have on hand. It cost me about 55¢ per pound.

We are all well. School is out today. We have 9 acres in Glads. I am using your tractor about one day in two weeks. It will sell readily if you wish.

Strawberries are very poor, less than $\frac{1}{2}$ crop. Raspberries best in 10 years Blacks probably 40% crop.

We all hope you folks are well and expect that the baby is getting about big enough to be a cow puncher.
