TULE LAKE TRANSFER

FUTURE STATUS OF WORKERS

"The future status of those employees, presently registered with the Adm. office, after being relocated in the new center is undetermined as yet. The only assurances we can give is that those who are deserving will be given recommendations." William Dougherty, assistant manager stated today.

PROCEDURE ANNOUNCED

From authoritative sources, the rules and regulations governing the transfer to the Tulalake relocation center have been released. Commencing on June 24, residents will be transferred by train in groups of 500, beginning from block six.

At 4:30 p.m. the first group will be transported by bus to Pearson's Spur, located about one mile north from this Center.

A passenger car adjoining the sleeper will have facilities for the proper care of babies. A special effort will be made to keep family members as close as possible to those in the latter two cars.

Baggages should be separated into three groups, namely: Group one, composed of the barest essentials for the trip, to be carried by the evacuee on the train; group two, composed of personal effects needed immediately before leaving here and after arriving at the new center, to be carried on the baggage car; group three, composed of the remaining belongings, to be transported by freight car a few days before the evacuee leaves. Baggage tags will be provided.

All belongings will be inspected thoroughly in the respective apartments. (Please turn to p. 2)

Hello Yorky,

Just a line to let you know we're at Tulalake and all is well.

Left West Sacramento 6 p.m. Friday by bus for Free Port where we transferred to the S. P. at 8:30 p.m. Reached Tule about noon next day after an overnight ride.

The ten of us were given two large rooms which are lined with either plywood, celetex or fireproof cardboard. There is plenty of lumber now to build shelves and things. Each room has a wood stove. Showers and toilet facilities are good.

Portland people are already here. Hope you will join us soon.

in the near future. For this reason, final packing should not begin prior to inspection. Hereafter, no outside purchasing by residents of this center will be permitted.

Everything provided by the government must be returned before departure. This applies to spoons, cups, dishes, milk bottles, and other utensils taken from the mess halls.

Sleeper accommodations will be furnished for invalids and mothers with young babies, and only if approved by the public health doctors.

Patients too ill to travel will be hospitalized in a local hospital.

The family number which the evacuee received at the control station will be the permanent number. The "ID" number was only for use in this center.

The government will assume transportation expense of property now in government or private storage. Specific instructions as to the method of receiving such goods will be announced after reaching the relocation center.

Arbo-Gram,

We are located in a migratory labor camp with fine housing and excellent sanitation. Included in our facilities are a modern field and gymnasium.

The houses are well built; cement floors, shingle roofs, rustic wall outside and plywood inside, double partitions between rooms, screen windows, green lawns around the buildings, beds and springs to accommodate two to four persons, one all metal table, two metal chairs, and a small stove.

There is no curfew in this camp. We can see movies at least once a week and we can see night ball games.

A relocation center is being constructed, about fifteen miles from here.
