



KING BASEBALL REIGNS TOMORROW FREE COUPON BOOKS TO BE ISSUED

DISTRIBUTION WILL BEGIN ON JULY 1

The July free coupon book allotment will be issued from July 1 to 11 to all eligible persons applying for them.

Single persons 16 years of age and over will receive \$2.50 in coupons a month while married couples will receive a \$4.00 book together. Although children under 16 years of age will receive one dollar in coupons; the maximum amount any one family may receive is \$7.50.

Books can be applied for by the following persons:

1. For husband and wife jointly, only the husband may apply.
2. For husband and wife and children under 16 years of age only the father may apply.
3. For mother (father not living or not at Center) with children

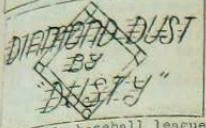
