# IMPROVEMENT

Since our arrival at the Fresno Assembly Center, we have been greatly impressed by the extensive improvements made by the Works Division under the supervision of G. H. Merrill and his assistants, H. Condeo, J. W. Bennett and J. Milloy.

Perhaps, many of us have not realized the tasks which this division has undertaken. It has wide array of functions to perform... from the maintenance of the grounds to the construction works. Everyone in this Center has been benefited thereby and has enabled us to live and work more comfortably under circumstances. Not only do they work at day time, but also, many instances at nights.

There are twelve division heads with more than 300 workers employed.

In the Works Division there is a drafting room, headed by K. Goto, U. C. Graduate. He and his co-workers sketched plans for all the construction works. It has drafted plans for the amphitheater, playground, file boxes, basketball stands and boxing stand. Incidentally, plans for barber shop and beauty salon which is about to come up also have been drafted by them.

# PIPES INSTALLED

The pipe lines which are being installed between the barracks are under the supervision of H. Hayakawa. Plumbing works in the Center are all taken up by this branch.

F. Hayashida manages the installation of drinking fountains and plans for the barracks. The lay-out of the ball grounds across Butler is attributed to Frank Shiba. He and his men supervise the flooding of the ball diamonds.

All of the carpentry works are performed by Mas Harano and B. Yoshida who are in charge of the inside and the outside carpenter crews respectively. Former has supervised the constructions such as platform in the amphitheater, tables and bedside stools for the hospitals. Furnitures for the offices have been provided by this department. This division has made ping pong tables, punching bag racks and basketball stands for the recreation department. The latter has directed the construction of additions to canteen, kitchens, and sunrooms for the hospitals.

# TRASH DISPOSAL

T. Asaki heads the general labor division for the issue in cleaning the grounds inside the Center while H. Masai performs similar duties on Butler, Maple and Ventura avenues.

The trash disposal, water wagon, and general cleanup details are under the direction of D. Iwanoto.

All of the cementing works which have been done in the shower rooms and in the kitchens are handled by P. Tsuchiya. H. Murashima is in charge of the general painting such as signs.

The electrical department, under the supervision of O. Fujii, makes routine check-ups of all the electrical equipments every other day. It has also installed two-hundred toilet seats. Again this division has repaired two-hundred fifty radios, one hundred fifty fans, and washing machines. Improvements of lighting facilities in the library, mess halls, hospitals and the administration offices have also been made.

The farm project is under the direction of E. Sasaki, U. C. Graduate. The lands between hospitals #1 and #2 and #3 will be utilized to grow vegetables.

The Works Division should be greatly commended in the manner it has been performing these numerous functions. --By Howard Renge
