

C. Applications for Transfer:

Individuals desiring transfers for any reason coming within the purview of Paragraph B above, will make application only to the Center Manager of the Center in which they are residents. In order to insure that applications are made only to Center Manager. the provisions of this paragraph of the peration Manual will be placed on Conterbulletin boards and otherwise disseminated so that all evacuees are acquainted with the contents thereof. At that time evacuees will be informed that requests received in this office from sources other than through the Center Hanager will be returned, without action, to the Center Manager for prop investigation and submission.
