RESIDENTS EAT CENTER GROWN VEGETABLES

Radishes were the first crop harvested in the Center when nine dozen bunches of the legumes were delivered to four mess halls on Wednesday and Thursday according to Everett Sasaki, chairman of the farm project.

The agriculture department expressed satisfaction on their harvest proclaiming the radishes "bumper crop". Sasaki said this is the first of the varied Center vegetables to be consumed in the mess halls.

To plan for poultry production at relocation centers, the vocational educational division will start a course to be held thrice weekly. Kay Miya, former faculty assistant at the University of California agriculture branch at Davis, will conduct the meetings.

A series of soil samples from the Davis institution has been received by Charles Nishi to supplement the material for soil study in the education course.

The George Abe nursery of Selma has donated a second shipment of shrubs for Center beautification work.

CITIZENSHIP BAN HITS SNAG

The WRA, ever vigilant of the welfare and future of evacuated Japanese, has followed the latest attempt to disenfranchise American citizens of Japanese ancestry very closely.

S. R. Fryer, Regional director, writes to Roy Nash, project director thus:

"In your letter of June 29 you asked for information concerning a lawsuit brought through former Attorney General Webb to disenfranchise American citizens of Japanese ancestry....."

"On July 2 the court dismissed the complaint.... The Civil Liberties Union did not appear in the suit, but a representative of the Lawyers' Guild appeared as a friend of the court to argue Mr. Webb's contentions and to file a brief for the court's consideration.

"The War Relocation Authority legal staff advised closely from its inception. Our legal staff advised us that the legal theory upon which Mr. Webb relied was exceedingly weak and that the complaint has been most certainly be dismissed. That prediction has been fulfilled."

MEDICAL STAFF PRAISED

Considering the amount of facilities they have been given to work with, the hospital staff headed by Dr. Hashiba and his assistants, Dr. K. Taira and Dr. K. Koda, the staff has been able to maintain a creditable record for the past two months in keeping the patients down to the minimum of less than one per cent of the total of some five thousand persons, which comprises the Center population.

It is gratifying and commendable to note the fine service rendered by the hospital staff. There are approximately ninety persons employed for the three hospitals. And it is evidenced by the past records that the hospital staff works in unity--giving one's best for the sake of this community.

One does not realize the efficiency of the entire crew nor appreciates their service, until one is confined to one of the hospital beds for several weeks. Besides the duties of the individuals, each must observe and obey the hospital ethics, rules and regulations. In brief, the Center hospital is operated by a competent staff of men and women to serve the community as efficiently as possible.

To help maintain the fine record of the hospital staff, the people of this Center can cooperate by these constructive suggestions: keep your apartments spic and span at all times, wash your hands clean before going to each meal, call on doctors at the first sign of a cold and strictly observe all clinic hours as announced by the staff.
