CLOTHING ALLOTMENT BEGINS MONDAY

"EVENING OF ROMANCE" SCHEDULED FOR MONDAY

N.R.C. PIANIST RALPH KUETTEL TO BE GUEST ARTIST

Two months of intensive preparations for what looms as the most elaborate entertainment presentation ever attempted here, will reach its climax Monday night at 10:30 in the Center Bowl when the curtain is drawn for the first number of the symphonic musicale, "An Evening of Romance", a production of the "Associated Producers and Artists".

led by Guest artist Ralph Kuettel, N. B. C. network pianist, a cast of 75 artists will perform in this show which is dedicated to the wedding anniversary of Assistant Center Manager E. A. Dunn and Mrs. Dunn. Coincidental but timely is the fact that there will be a full moon that night.

SPECIAL NUMBER FOR DUMES

The special number honoring the pair will be the instrumental presentation of "Urashima", a Japanese folk tale. Mrs. Taka Ono, Michiyo Nishimura and Kikuyo Ego will play the "gamisen", or the Japanese guitar; while Mrs. Sugimori will play the "tsuzumi", a Japanese hand drum.

Kuettel will pick several of his favorite pieces from his weekly "Moods in Ivory" program. He will also play an original Japanese composition.

CLASSICALS TO BE FEATURED

This undertaking is different from any previous talent production here in that it will be the first show where the works of leading composers of classical music will be featured. Classical Japanese songs and dances will also be introduced.

Prod Harada and his 30 piece symphony orchestra will make its debut playing Dr. Arthur C. Berdahl's arrangement of "I'll See You Again". Berdahl is the conductor of the Fresno Symphony Orchestra and Professor of Music at Fresno State College.

NEW CENTER REGULATIONS ARE REVEALED

The new Center regulations released Thursday by E. P. Pulliam, Center Manager, make it compulsory that all radios and lights of every kind in all evacuee's quarters be turned off by the occupants not later than 10:30 p. m., remaining off throughout the hours of darkness.

These new rulings will go into effect this Monday.

Exceptions are permitted in case of fire, sickness, pregnant mothers, mothers with young children and other necessary cases when written permission has been obtained from the Center Manager.

Orders will be accepted during the time and day indicated on the schedule on this page. The schedule should be cut out and kept as residents are asked to adhere strictly to the time and day they may place orders.

Notification of the arrival of clothes will be made through the mail.

PLEASING YOUR PALATE

A wellfilled stomach is the way to a happy disposition. Much of the credit for the harmony of this Center can be attributed to the efforts of Frank U. Bliss of the Mess and Lodging Division and his assistants.

Since the inception of this Center, the Mess and Lodging Division has undertaken the gigantic task of feeding 5000 people three times daily in a satisfactory manner. Many problems had to be met at the beginning, and the department worked tirelessly under the handicap of limited facilities. Not content with just feeding the people, the department made it its duty to serve as much as possible, the foods desired by the people. The appearance of shrimp sushi, tomato oshioyuk, and suki-yaki on the menus has been greeted with pleasurable surprise by the residents of the Center. To serve those foods and yet maintain a satisfactory balance of foods in the American style is the goal of this department," states Chief Steward Clifton B. Snelsen.

Although many foodstuffs are difficult to obtain, especially in large quantities due to present conditions, the Mess and Lodging Division is exerting every effort to obtain whatever is available. The preparation of Japanese dishes has been aided by the generous donations of various ingredients by the residents themselves. Such wholehearted cooperation by those who have such ingredients to donate for the enjoyment of everyone is to be highly commended. The residents of the Center are fortunate to have such capable personnel in charge of a function that vitally concerns them.

Not only do they keep mentally awake, but by playing games which would maintain their health, they strive to be "physically straight." Scouting has also offered an opportunity to acquire knowledge of different vocations and hobbies.

The Boy Scouts are to be commended for their fine spirit and splendid service toward the community. Truly it is an organization well worth joining.

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REFRIGERATION COMPARTMENTS ARE COMPLETED

Three walk in refrigeration compartments were completed recently in Warehouse 13 in Section G. Bill Yamamoto, foreman of the group, said the temperature of the ice boxes will be 38 degrees Fahrenheit at all times.

Two tons of ice are stored in compartment No. 1, while there are four tons of ice in each of boxes 2 and 3. The ice is placed in the upper half of the ice box. The ice conveyor from the warehouse entrance to each ice box has also been constructed to help save time. What is stored in box No. 1 while boxes 2 and 3 are used for fruits and vegetables.

In a week's time, the grids will be constructed to wash vegetables in the warehouse. The grids will be forty four feet long and will have a steady stream of water to enable vegetable washers to do large amounts in a short period of time.

NO MORE NECK STRETCHING, GREASE PITS INSTALLED

"Grease monkeys" in the mechanic division can now work standing up, as a special grease pit has been dug for their use. The pit is over five feet deep and is used to service all motor vehicles in the Center.

The other improvement as reported by Henry Tashima, chief mechanic, is the additional stall to store 800 gallons of gasoline.

Without the written permission by the Center Manager, no property, articles or equipment belonging to or in custody of the U.S. Government or any of its agencies shall be moved by evacuees from one building or location to another location.

NO COOKING ALLOWED

Excepting formula foods for infants, the possession of or serving of foods which require heating or cooking, will not be allowed in the quarters. Violation of this rule will result in the confiscation without compensation, of all such articles.

All Japanese phonograph records, will be turned in to the Office of the Internal Police Department not later than this Monday.

The possession of perishable foods, excepting fresh fruits, will not be allowed.

Each evacuee in this Center must be instructed in these regulations thoroughly.

It will be the duty of anyone who can read to instruct non-readers.
