TOTS SPLASH HAPPILY AS POOL OPENS



With eager cries the Center children splashed happily this week as two large wading pools were officially opened.

The two pools, built by the Works Division under the supervision of C. H. Merrill, are 40 by 20 feet each and range from 12 inches to 18 inches in depth. Chlorine will be used to sterilize the water. Each pool will be under the supervision of a recreational leader.

HAVE YOU MET ETTA KETT? MEET HER TUESDAY NIGHT

A burlesque program on manners titled "Have you Met Etta Kett" will replace the regular younger group forum Tuesday evening in Recreation Hall 2 at 8 o'clock.

Toyoko Hoshiko, Dorothy Echinaga, Atsuko Shimasaki, Hide Dakuzaku and Harry Yoshida will present a series of skits showing common misuses made by Center residents in daily life.

The skits will be followed by a discussion period to formulate rules to apply to the peculiarities of Center life.

WELFARE WORKERS READY TO SERVE COMMUNITY

The Social Welfare office in the Women's Shower Annex C will assist all Center residents with their business affairs or problems, according to Seichi Mikami, head of the office.

"We will notarize selective service questionnaires and all affidavits that have to be notarized. Legal documents will also be taken care of," he stated. "These services come under the Welfare office and there will be no charge."

PICKLING DONE ON BIG SCALE

Taking the responsibility of pickling 12 crates of cabbage, 40 lug boxes of cucumbers and 20 lug boxes of egg plants at the average of two to three times per week is a tremendous undertaking as single servings require nearly all of the above supplies. Such is the work being done by Mr. and Mrs. Chujiro Nakagawa assisted by Mrs. Miyo Yamasaki, Mrs. Chisa Yamao and Mrs. Tama Miyasaki in Warehouse 13.

Cucumbers, cabbage and egg plants are all pickled in the 50 gallon barrels and they are removed into ten gallon units before distribution to the Mess Halls.

DO NOT ORDER CLOTHING NOW IF NOT NEEDED

If a family has an ample supply of clothing on hand now, Frank Pimental, the clothing director, requests they get their clothing allotment at a later date to prevent unnecessary congestion at the order department.

"If a family did not order their full allotted amount, they will help us if they do not apply for the rest of the allotment their next scheduled time," Pimental continued.

ALLOWANCE IS CUMULATIVE

The allowance is cumulative from the date of your entry into this Center and valid until the time you leave.

Cash script books and the clothing allotment are valid in any WCCA Centers but are not accepted in the War Relocation Centers. The issue books are accepted only in this Center.

Editorial PROFANE LANGUAGE IS BAD EXAMPLE FOR CHILDREN

In a closely-knit society such as ours, we are vitally concerned over the welfare of everyone. Our actions and conducts have tremendous repercussions upon the community as a whole. The physical well-being of the Center residents has been greatly enhanced by the cooperative spirit shown by the Administration and the residents.

It is beyond reasonable doubt that our physical well-being and environment must be given primary consideration, when we consider the circumstances in which we find ourselves. However this does not imply that our moral conducts and standards should be neglected. We are now aware that our moral conduct has not been very favorable in many instances. Probably many of us have been cognizant of that fact that we have been uttering unnecessarily profane language. Frequently these profane expressions are made unconsciously or unintentionally.

Let us bear in mind that we have among our midst youngsters who are ignorant of these words. They do not have the ability to make moral judgments. Therefore it is incumbent upon the older people to refrain from using such language, especially in the presence of these youngsters, who must be encouraged not to utter these expressions when they do use them. We would like to see them become persons of high moral integrity who will, when they go back to their normal state of life, be able to participate capably in the affairs of society.
