COUPON BOOKS GIVE WAY TO PAY CHECKS

The August free coupon book issuance was temporarily halted to enable the July payroll checks totaling \$17,079.59 to be issued at the Center cashier's window.

Due to the absence of Center Cashier, M. E. Johnson, who left today to take his examination for the army, the cashier's window will be closed to all business from Monday till Wednesday.

Checks, issue books and cash books may be obtained from Wednesday morning. Numbers will not be necessary to secure issue books.

June and July issue books totaled \$19,305, while \$8,319.50 worth of August issue books have been given out to date.
